**APPROVE NEW FLAG**

The commons' flag committee report should be accepted by Parliament without prolonged debates, Dr. Harry Harley, MP for Halton, said this week. In an interview, Dr. Harley said he finds the new flag design acceptable and preferred it to the previous three maple leaf design proposed by the government, although he was not wedded to the idea of one or three leaves. "There should not necessarily be an election on the issue and I hope there is not one, but it will depend on the attitude of the official opposition," Dr. Harley said. "An all-party committee of the House made this decision and if its recommendation is not accepted, it could lead to an election and to division in the country."

He said he was particularly pleased that one of the votes in the flag committee had been 14 to 0 in favour of a distinctive flag for Canada. The Halton MP said he also favored the choice of the Union Jack, the flag of the mother country as the flag to denote Canada's commonwealth connections.

Speaking of Liberal Grant Deachman and his publication of a report on the committee prior to the tabling in the commons, Dr. Harley said he did not condone this action. "I imagine Mr. Deachman was provoked by what Mr. Diefenbaker had said on television the night before, but I think his action was unfortunate and I see no reason why he should not appear before the commons' privileges and elections committee," Dr. Harley said.

Only a week after celebrating his fiftieth wedding anniversary with a reception at Halton Manor, Joseph Henry Hoare, 80 died on October 25. He was a descendant of one of Esqueping's pioneer families. Son of William and Sarah Mullin Hoare, he was born on the present Cecil Barth farm. His parents moved to a farm next to Union Presbyterian Church when he was a child, and he was a farmer there until his retirement twelve years ago. Mr. and Mrs. Hoare later lived in Gies Williams and for the past few years had made Delson their home at the Manor in Milton. He was a lifelong member of Union Church and had served on the board of managers. He leaves his wife, Mary Elizabeth Michie. Rev. Robert Duncanson conducted the funeral service in the church on October 27 and interment was in Greenwood Cemetery, Georgetown. Pallbearers were Vern Thompson, Fred Lyons, Bert Dixon, Joe Eason, Norman Icam and Frank Patch. Flower bearers were Leslie Young, Clarence Anderson, Wilfrid Lealle and Howard Delson.

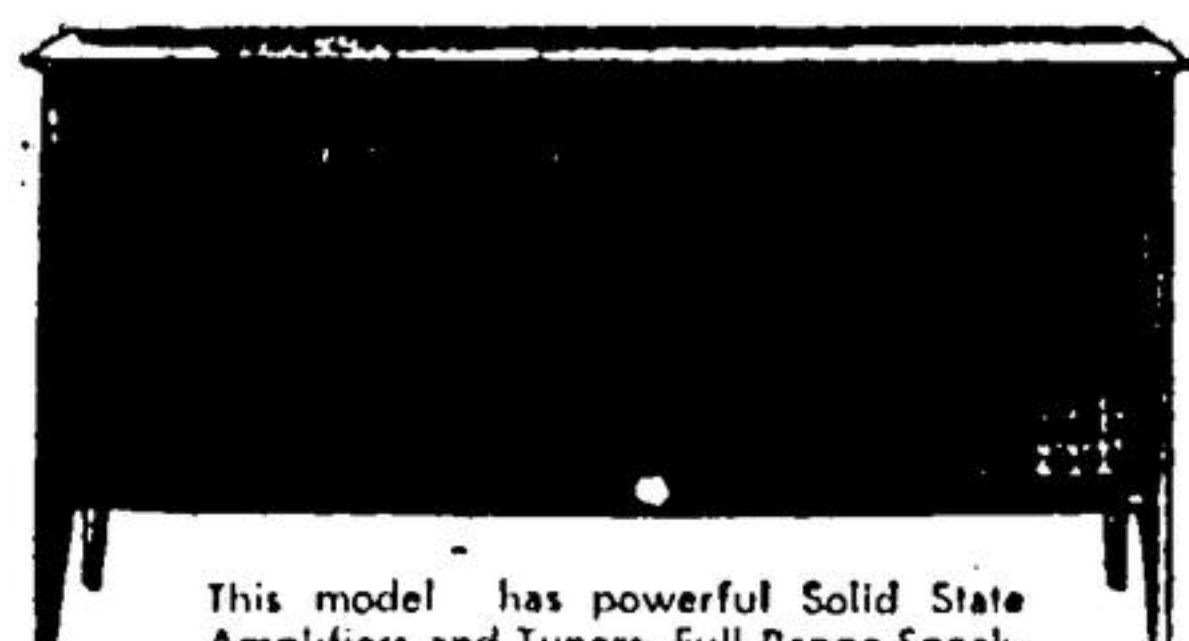
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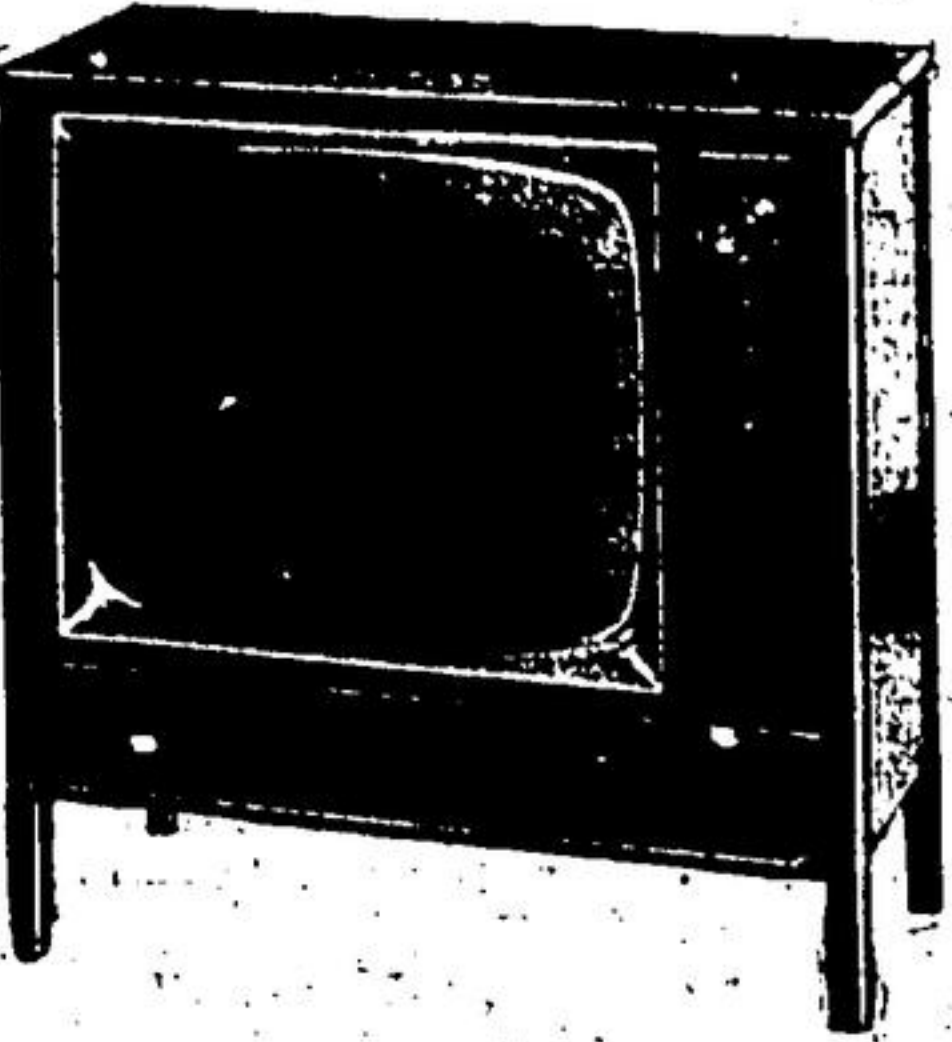
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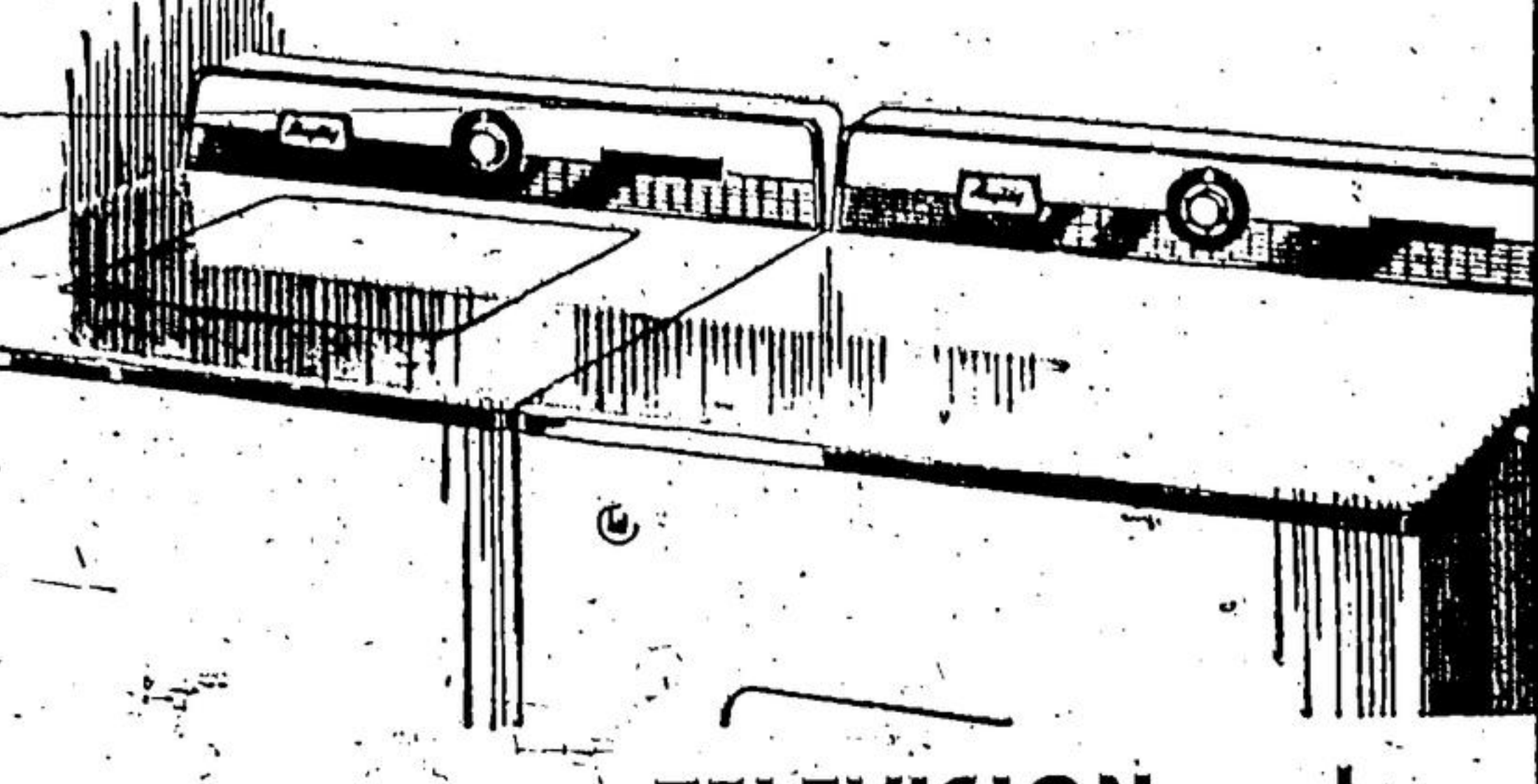
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
