# No Building Permit Orders Shed Removed

Building inspector W. Hulla remained adamant in his stand on Ubo Mierema's horse shed at Esqueping Council Monday night. "It has to come down," he told both council and Mr. Mierema.

Mr. Mierema explained that he started building the stable without a permit, which he now knows was wrong. However, he claimed Mr. Hulla saw it when it was half done, and advised him to change it to comply with regulations. This he did, according to Mr. Mierema, then the building inspector came back and told him to tear it down.

The Reeve, who had just inspected the building that afternoon, pointed out that the building was close to the fence, possibly only a foot or eighteen inches away.

"It doesn't come up to township requirements at all," stated W. Hulla. "It is built on a garage. I told him he could leave it till spring when the horse went out to grass," he added.

Councillor W. Linham pointed out that there is nothing to stop anyone having a horse in Norval. Continuing he stated there is a regulation saying a building must be five feet from the fence.

Reeve Leslie explained that an eavestrough would take an water along and into the same ditch on the next property, where the water is now going.

Councillor G. Currie felt that if repairs had to be done from the next property, the building was too close to the fence.

W. Hill, a friend of Mierema, claimed that the building of plywood would not need repairs for some time, and went on to say that an eavestrough could be put up without going on the neighbouring property.

After a lull, the Reeve remarked that the township didn't want lean-tos going up all over. Cr. Currie stated that it was the building inspector's business, since he was hired for the job.

"Would you back a building inspector who told him to go ahead, and fix it, then after it is fixed tell him to tear it down," demanded W. Hill.

"That's where the trouble lies, all right," agreed Council. W. Linham.

After all the discussion Inspector Hulla still insisted the building must come down.

An unusually high number of sheep are being destroyed by dogs in the township, according to evaluator Nielson Stark, as he presented the claims of two residents James Stark lost four sheep, and Brigadier F. C. Wallace lost 10 sheep. The township reimbursed Mr. Stark \$60, and Brigadier Wallace \$372.

Building permits valued at \$78,200 were issued in Esqueping during October. The buildings were dwellings or garages.

## Province Names McMillan As Conservation Chairman

"I appreciate the confidence shown in me and will do my best to further the interests of conservation in the watershed," chairman Roy K. McMillan said last week following the news that he had been appointed the chairman of Credit Valley Conservation Authority by the provincial government.

This makes him one of only two appointed chairmen in Ontario — the other is Dr. Ross Lord of Metro Toronto region. Mr. McMillan's appointment was backed unanimously by members of the CVCA and in speaking to them Thursday he said "Alone the chairman can do very little. It is the cooperation of all members which makes or breaks the projects suggested."

In public life for 30 years, Mr. McMillan has been a member of Streetsville school board and council. He has represented Ward 4, Toronto Township for the past 11 years. Now completing his third term as elected chairman of the CVCA, he was for four years chairman of the parks and recreation advisory board.

During his term as chairman, formal approval was signed with 16 municipalities to proceed with a five and a half million dollar flood control plan. Final arrangements are being completed to form the CVCA Foundation which may accept gifts of money, property and equipment for the Authority. An ambitious program of tree planting has been undertaken and many acres have been acquired in valley areas for conservation purposes.

R. C. Smith, former publisher of the Port Credit Weekly was also appointed a member of the CVCA by the same order-in-council last week.

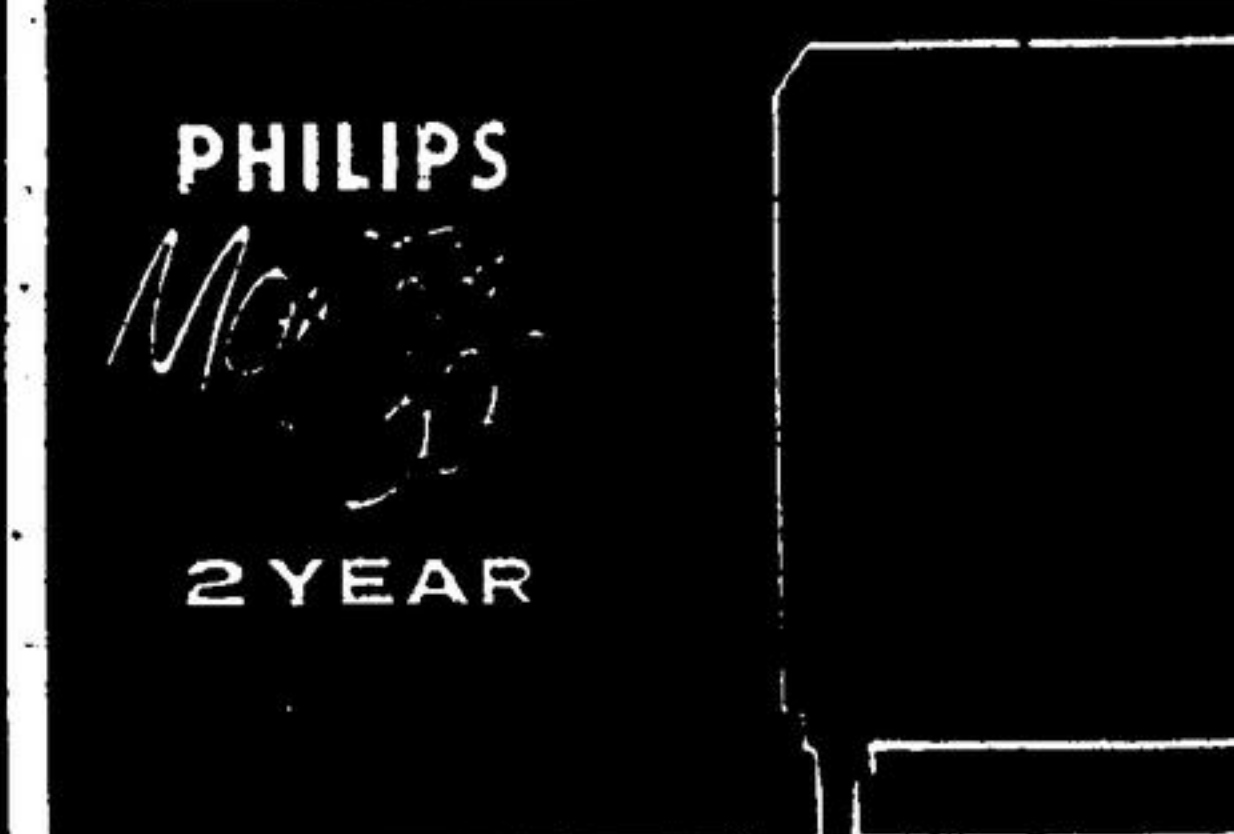
H. Arnold Blachford has been appointed Bell Telephone Company manager for Georgetown and the surrounding area.
