

High School Staffer OSSTF Vice-President

Georgetown District High School staff member Mike Peleschak has been elected vice-president of the Ontario Secondary School Teachers' Federation, District 12. The new executive was named at the annual banquet and meeting of the Federation in Brampton on Wednesday, October 23rd.

The meeting was highlighted by a speech by E. W. Williams of Brampton, the 1964-65 past president, who paid tribute to the members of the teaching profession who had helped the welfare of teachers. He challenged the young teachers to participate more fully in Federation affairs and to become 'good teachers rather than administrators.'

"All too often we are too busy living with burning interests of sentiment, consequently we fail to realize the importance of the Federation," W. Stoddart, Executive Secretary told the assembly. "Six years ago we were a family of 7,500 teachers within 18 Districts, while today there are over 20,000 teachers within 31 districts. We are adding 5,000 new teachers per annum to the profession."

He said automation must be introduced to relieve the administrative load on the Federation head office. Automation must be integrated into the school system to assist the principals in their managerial tasks. Principals do not have a homogeneous monolithic group to handle, but their task is similar to key executive posts held by presidents of large companies. "It is certain that principals' salaries will be increased in proportion to the greater responsibilities put upon them," he concluded.

Resolutions to be sent to the Annual Assembly for approval included the organization of curriculum reform, pension changes, certification and professional development.

RECIPE OF THE MONTH
Baked Pears with Marshmallows
Quick Oven Dessert
6 Canada Choice Canned Pear Halves
1 tablespoon sugar
1/2 tsp. cinnamon
1 lemon, sliced paper thin
6 marshmallows
Place drained pear halves in a baking dish with 1/2 cup of their juices. Mix sugar and cinnamon together and sprinkle over pears. Place a paper-thin slice of lemon on each pear half and a marshmallow on top of the lemon slice. Place in a moderately hot oven (400 degs. F.) for about 5 minutes or until marshmallows are delicately browned and pears are heated through. Serve immediately, pouring the juice left in the baking pan over the pears.
