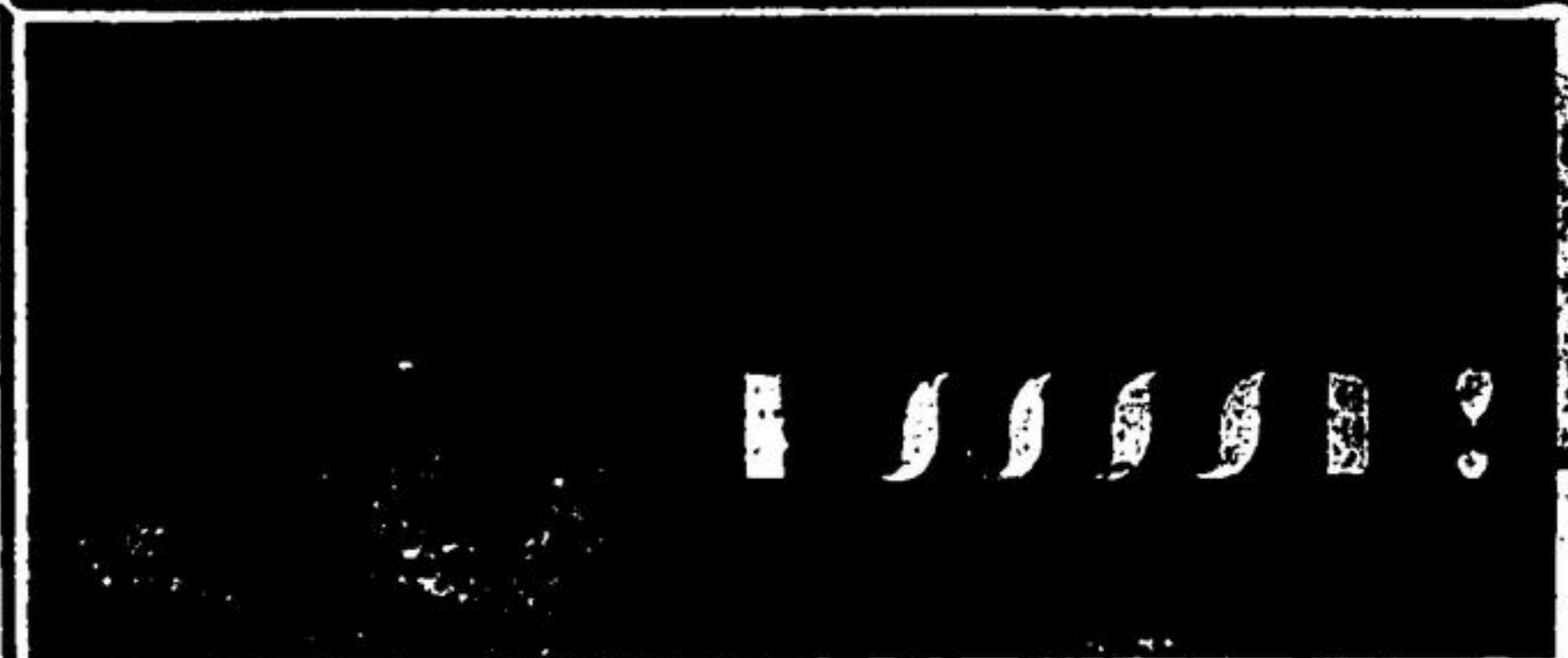

Now for Santa Parade**

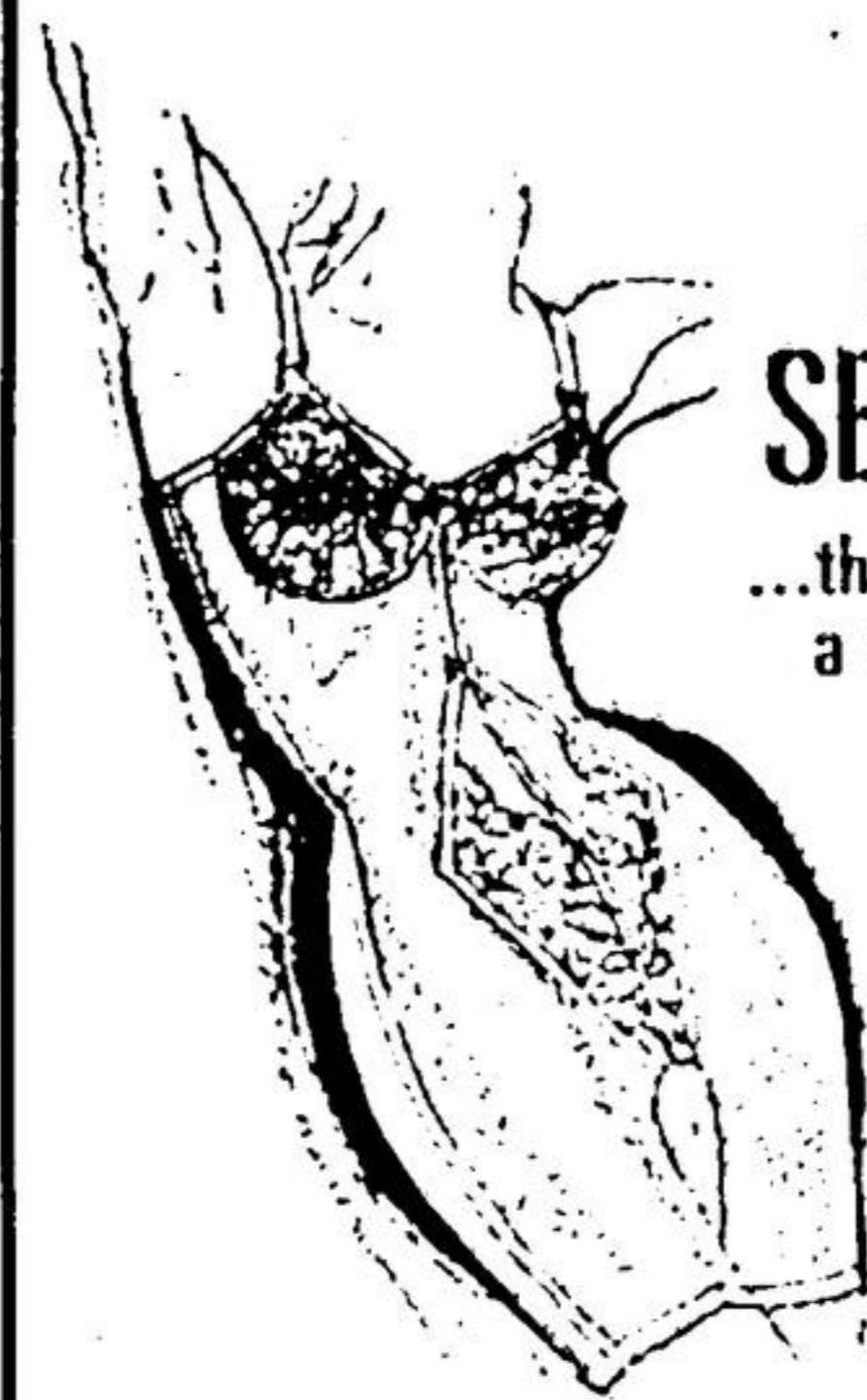
Organizations are being asked to plan floats for entry in the annual Santa Claus parade which the Lions Club will sponsor on December 12.
