Toc Alpha Visitors For Concluding Youth Forum

The subject of cigarette smoking was presented to Sunday's Youth Forum, at the Legion Hall, by Dr. J. Gregory Fraser, of the Alcoholism and Drug Addiction Research Foundation. "It is generally agreed," said Dr. Fraser "that for teenagers cigarette smoking is a symbol of adulthood; but surely there are more effective ways of showing your maturity than by smoking."

Briefly reviewing the history of smoking, Dr. Fraser said that many years ago it was believed that tobacco possessed certain beneficial properties; this is in direct conflict with the present day statement that tobacco is harmful. Smoking used to be for men only, but then cigarettes were introduced to indulge the ladies, and no self-respecting man would ever be caught with a cigarette.

In 17th century Russia, Dr. Fraser pointed out, the death penalty could be imposed on anyone who smoked, and up until this present century it was considered the height of bad manners to smoke in another person's home.

"One of the best ways to stop smoking," said Dr. Fraser, "is to declare to your friends and associates your intention to quit, and then choose a time to stop when you are not under stress or involved in a burst of social activities." The Alcoholism and Drug Addiction Research Foundation is an agency of the Province of Ontario, and exists to help people in their efforts to overcome addiction to alcohol and all forms of drugs, including tobacco.

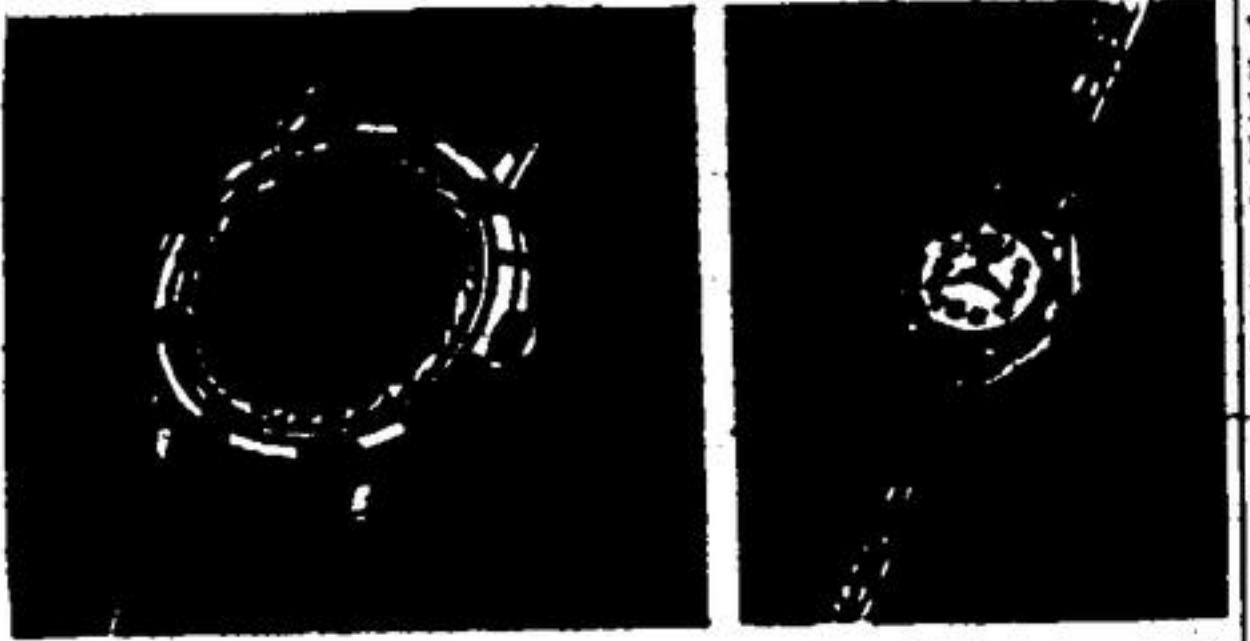

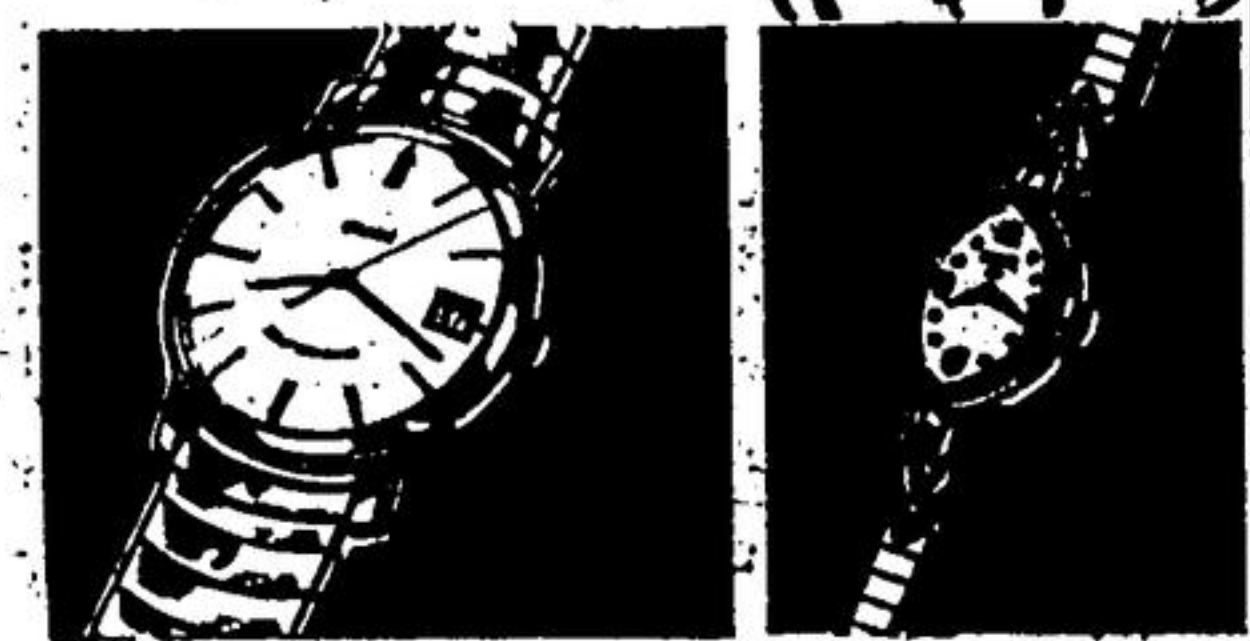
