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Blair Battles to Keep Lacrosse National Game

Huttenville's Ed Blair, who is president of the Canadian Lacrosse Association, has a battle on his hands to keep lacrosse Canada's national sport and crush a bill in the House of Commons recommending that hockey be recognized as this country's national game.

Jack Roxborough, Liberal M.P. for Simcoe and former president of the Canadian Amateur Hockey Association, introduced the bill that Mr. Blair and supporters hope to block.

The political warfare began when the NDP member for the British Columbia riding of Burnaby-Richmond, introduced a bill to name lacrosse as the national game. Mr. Blair agreed and immediately began circulating help from the Royal Canadian Legion, the National Indian Council and the Ontario Athletic Commission.

There's no proof in the government archives (due to a fire some years ago that destroyed many valuable and historical documents) but it has been thought since Confederation in 1867 that lacrosse was the national game.

"Lacrosse is the only game that is purely Canadian," said Jim Nalah "Canada has the only lacrosse stick factory in the world at Cornwall, Ontario."

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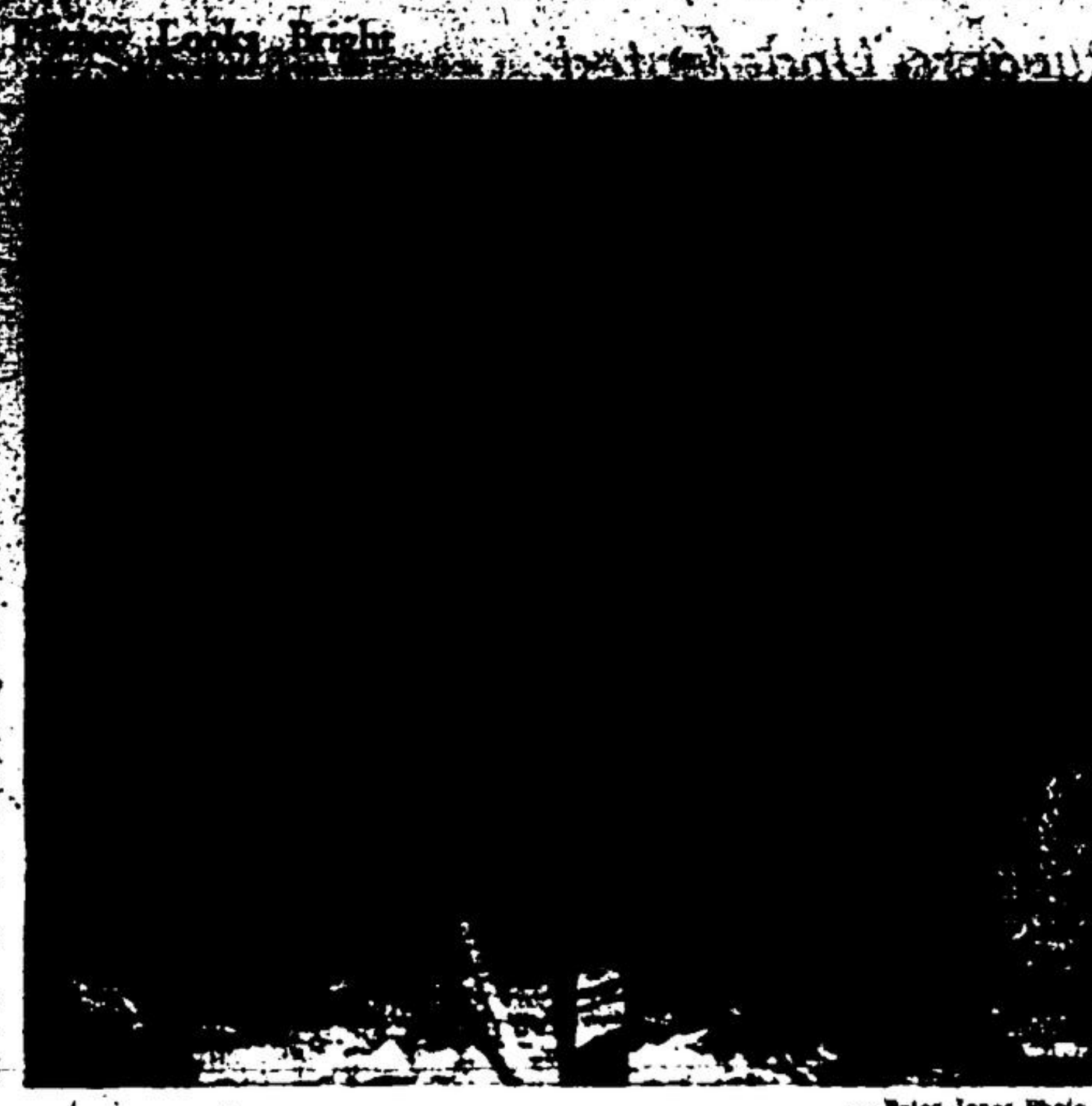
