

## Hospital Grants Being Reviewed, County Council

No immediate action was taken by Halton County Council to raise the hospital grants, but a definite decision to review the grants is being made.

The discussion was sparked by last month's request from the Joseph Brant Hospital Board of Governors that the present \$4,000 per bed grant be raised back to the previous level of \$6,000 per bed, and that a 372 bed addition be approved.

The Joseph Brant Board of Governors also asked that the 3.5 ratio of beds per thousand population used to determine the need for more beds, be reconsidered.

Deputy Reeve E. Rogers of Burlington claimed that the population of Burlington has increased ten thousand in the last two years, and even with the proposed addition would be filled by 1970. However, he pointed out that Oakville Hospital still has empty beds, so the proposal should be studied further before approval is given.

Reeve H. Merry admitted some empty beds existed in Oakville Hospital, but only in certain wards. He felt that up till now Oakville had the lion's share of hospital grants, and now Burlington should be brought up to the same level.

Warden C. Gallagher pointed out that all the hospitals had been constructed while the \$6,000 per bed grant was in operation.

Reeve H. Nicol of Acton felt that his municipality did not benefit at all from the hospital grants, and would be opposed to any increase.

Admitting that the northern municipalities might not get their share, Deputy Reeve F. Rogers explained that only a large municipality can carry a large hospital, plus the fact the specialized facilities are available to all.

In conclusion, Committee

Chairman Herb Merry agreed that a study of changes in the hospital grants by-law would be studied, and expressed the hope it would be dealt with by the 1964 council, rather than referring it to a new council.

## Apples Grown Here Are Munched in West Indies

At least one area man, Al Ferri of Huttonville, is busy making hay while the sun shines. Not literally, of course, because Mr. Ferri actually is in the apple growing business.

At present Mr. Ferri is busy making up shipments of Delicious apples to be sent to Trinidad. A total of 780 boxes were shipped about two weeks ago, and a further 800 boxes still have to be sent. The previous order, filled was for 1,000 boxes sent to England.

Apples are sent through a Montreal agent. They go by truck to Montreal, and are then shipped to various destinations.

"All we do here is packing and shipping, the agent gets the orders, and we don't sell under our own name," said Mr. Ferri. "I wish we could."

Some years ago various growers shipped under the name of "Big O".

Mr. Ferri explained that shipment of McIntosh apples goes on almost continuously up to the end of January, when shipment of fresh apples from Argentina start arriving to take over the export trade.

Mr. Ferri said he lost most of his apple crop last year, but in 1962 he shipped out about 8,000 boxes of apples. "Although everything is late this year," he said, "we hope to exceed the 8,000 figure. Of course we never know. It depends on what the agent can get for us in the way of orders."
