"With 1,213 pupils in the Esqueusing School Area," said Mrs. Shirley Armstrong, "it is a big and awesome responsibility for both the Board and parents." She admitted there was no easy answer, but suggested there could be some improvement in three fields.

She felt the people should know what the Board is doing, through better communication. In the field of organization, she advocated more efficiently handled business, which, she added, might result in a little less per pupil touch, but which could be counteracted by improved communication. She felt, also, that planning further ahead would be an advantage.

**Novral Man Was Prominent in Church Township Affairs**

Prominent in civic affairs, Nelson Alexander Robinson, 64, succumbed to a sudden heart attack on November 17.

A Hornby district native he had lived in Novral for 38 years. He was the son of the late Herbert and Bertha Armstrong Robinson.

He attended school at Hornby and Drumquinn, operated a butcher business and for many years had been a driver and livestock trucker, as well as operating a farm on the 8th Line near Hornby.

He leaves his wife, Laura Dennis, to whom he was married in 1926 in Toronto, a daughter, Mrs. George Barber, Jr. (Patricia) of Georgetown, sons, Duncan and Kenneth, Novral, 11 grandchildren, and brothers and sisters Bill Robinson, Hornby, Ab Robinson, Acton, Mrs. William Crozier (Edna), Newmarket, Mrs. Roy Cunningham, Fort Credit and Frank (Johnny) Robinson, Dundas. A brother Clifford predeceased him.

**Druggists Mother Dies in Stratford**

Georgetown pharmacist Stuart Young and his wife died their third child bereavement in a few months when his mother died in Stratford Tuesday.

Mrs. Young's parents died within a few days of each other this summer.

Mrs. George Young had been seriously ill since May and died in Avon Crest Stratford General Hospital. A native of Cranbrook, near Brussels, she was 74.

She moved to Stratford prior to her marriage in 1914 and had lived there ever since.

She was predeceased by her husband in 1925, and by eight brothers and sisters. 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the seven principals have improved since two principals a month have started attending the School Board meetings.

In a brief speech Kerwin McPhail, Esqueusing's representative to the Acton District High School Board stated that eighty pupils from Esqueusing attend the school, which now has an enrolment of 443. He suggested that high school board members be elected rather than appointed.

Clerk K. C. Lindsey explained that this could only be done by setting up a Board of Education.

Donald Lawson, Esqueusing representative to Georgetown High School Board paid tribute to the work of Col. G. O. Brown in education throughout the years.

He explained that Georgetown has to pay competitive salaries since they are surrounded by high paying areas. He told of the need for the addition for the fall of 1965, which will cost \$500,000 of which \$200,000 will be debentured.

In conclusion he warned against the forming of a Board of Education, saying it would cost almost twice as much per pupil.

Tuan Van Sackler, the other Esqueusing representative on the Georgetown Board very briefly covered transportation, saying it seemed to be running smoothly, and at \$3,000 less than previously.

A. E. Millson, reporting for Melford Gardhouse, Esqueusing representative to the Milton High School Board told of a 96 per cent jump in enrolment over the past few years, with 110 students from Esqueusing.

While declining this year because of pressure of business, Alfred Spruce made a qualified attack on last year's Board appointment. "I ran fourth last year," he said, "and I thought the appointment of someone else was undemocratic, and flouted the electorate. However, they were within their rights and I don't want to argue about it," he concluded.

Expressing surprise at his nomination, William Nellis said he thought he would run anyway, but changed his mind the next day.

"I concurred with Mrs. Armstrong that there should be communication between the Board and the public," said William Lawson, "but we are not getting it. The electors have to wait till nomination night to find out what is going on." He went on to chide newspapers of the area for their lack of service.

He criticized the School Board for moving so slowly in construction that they had to pay rental costs, plus the added cost of winter construction. "Up till 1964" he maintained, "no building was over \$14 per square foot, now it is \$18." He concluded by saying —
