Manufacturing Concerns Would Provide Work for the Retarded

North Halton's Association for Mentally Retarded Children has a massive publicity effort to win public support for its workshop.

"We won't be able to get the project off the ground unless we have widespread public support," said Mrs. R. P. E. Jeffares, principal of Sunshine School for retarded children.

The school is on the Seventh Line North of Hornby and has 20 children enrolled in it.

By law the school can only take retarded children from five to 18 years old. Mrs. Jeffares said. There are no facilities or programs for children over 18.

"They just go home to mark time," the principal added. "Girls might be useful around the home but boys have very little to do but watch TV endlessly."

The sheltered workshop is the answer she stressed. Children over 18 would be given light factory work to do. They would be trained for the work and supervised constantly.

Also they would receive payment corresponding to their work output. "A workshop gives meaning to their lives. It makes them useful."

Manufacturing concerns provide the light work for the retarded. It consists of such things as stuffing envelopes, putting wrappers on tissue

Wrigglesworth Teacher Applies For Year Experience Overseas

A grade 6 teacher at Wrigglesworth Public School, Robert Pinkerton, will be the first Georgetown teacher to be part of a Teacher Exchange program which will send him to England and bring an English teacher here in his place if arrangements can be made.

Mr. Pinkerton completed stage one of the swap when the Georgetown Public School Board approved his application for a Teachers Exchange Position for the 1965-66 term at a meeting Wednesday, Dec. 2 in Harrison public school.

The second stage hinges on the success of exchange officials to locate an English public school instructor willing to teach here for a year to complete the other half of the trade.

During Mr. Pinkerton's term overseas, the Georgetown Board would pay him his salary as though he were still here, and his replacement would receive his or her pay cheques from his or her home school board.

Mr. Pinkerton has registered his preference as a small town in northern England. Should arrangements be made he would leave early in

July, teach there for the 1965-66 term and arrive back here a week in advance of the 1966-67 school term.

Teachers must have at least 3 years teaching experience to take part in the exchange program. Mr. Pinkerton has been in the Wrigglesworth staff for 4 years, and prior to that he taught for 2 years at Harrison. Wrigglesworth principal William Knrade in explaining the teacher exchange program to trustees said the teachers gain new ideas and experience through their year abroad.

"In the long run the individual pupil is the gainer," he said.
