Proposed Farmers Union Draws Little Interest

The Ontario Farmers' Union failed to establish a local here last week as just three district farmers turned up at a meeting held in Hornby Orange Hall Friday night.

John Dolmer, Union president, told the three that farmers are caught in a price squeeze and through the Union can bring pressure on the government for a better price deal.

"Since 1961, prices for farm produce have declined 13 per cent while the cost to the consumer has increased 12 per cent," he said.

"Someone has picked up 25 per cent," he said. Mr. Dolmer claimed the retailers had gained the increase.

Mr. Dolmer said he hopes farmers from Halton will be in the majority which is claimed for this spring.

He said the Union has 338 Locals in the province, but declined to give the membership number. One member was signed up at the Friday meeting.

Mr. Dolmer ends his third term as reeve of Melancthon township in Dufferin county this year. He didn't seek reelection because he plans to devote more time to the Ontario Farmers' Union he said.
