They are then put in a cooler, ready for shipment to the butcher or to individual customers. Some are packed and frozen, kept there for demand throughout the year.

started twenty years ago, in the turkey business when it was simply a sideline to their farming. Then they bred their own turkeys, turning the eggs by hand every day. At that time they had between fifty and seventy five.

Later they bought the day old poult, about two hundred of them. Now they are handling approximately two thousand a year.

## Oshawa Strike Cuts 4 Hours Work at Standard

Employees at Standard Products lost approximately four hours work Friday as a result of the strike at General Motors' Oshawa plant. Employees were sent home at noon because work was caught up — but this week things are back to normal.

The strike settlement came shortly after the brief layoff here and the striking employees of GM Canada Limited were back to work Monday.

Ray Sage, manager of Prestite on Armstrong Ave., which weathered the strike without a work stoppage said he is now fearful that the impending steel strike will have its effect here.

He said the slowdown that will result in the motor manufacturing companies should the steelworkers walk out would likely be felt here eventually.

## Would Welcome Move Toward County Ambulance Service

Talk of a county-wide ambulance service which would assure private ambulance operators better collection of fees from transient cases as well as better service to people injured on provincial highways has prompted Murray McBeth of Alexander Ambulance Service, Oakville, and past president of the Ontario Ambulance Operators Association, to comment strongly in favour of such a service.

"Why shouldn't the county-wide service be set up?" he asked. "After all you have your fire department and other services on a countywide basis, and an ambulance service could be set up the same way."

Speaking to The Herald on the suggestion Georgetown Volunteer Ambulance Service officer Cec Davidson said some people do abuse the service by not paying when billed.

"In our situation it is regrettable that people don't appreciate that they should pay immediately. This is important so that the service can continue," he said.

"The local volunteers give of their time and talent freely

and go at any hour when on call," he said. "Personally I think there is an obligation on the person to whom the service is given to pay promptly."

"The Georgetown Volunteer Ambulance Service serves Esqueping Township in the same way it serves Georgetown but we charge Township residents double simply because the township pays nothing toward the ambulance maintenance and equipment," he said. "The township residents are actually penalized due to the lack of the over all cost being spread over the two local governments."

The request for a county-wide ambulance service was originally made last week at Milton town council meeting. Reeve Carl Martin suggested further that providing ambulance services should be a provincial rather than a county undertaking. He said the present service would be adequate if it were not for the high number of accidents and injuries on the provincial highways.
