

**November Recitalist Killed in Car Crash**

Sales manager for the Baldwin Organ Co., in Toronto, Gordon Shirley, 38, died in a car-truck collision at the intersection of Highways 7 and 27 on December 16th. Mr. Shirley had been heard by several local people when they attended an organ recital in Guelph early in November sponsored by the Barber Piano and Organ Co. A native of Kentucky, he was transferred with his firm to Toronto in May this year and moved into a home in Peel Village.

He leaves his wife and two young children.

Also killed in the crash was Grant McNight of Bradford, trapped in his cab when the truck he was driving burst into flames.

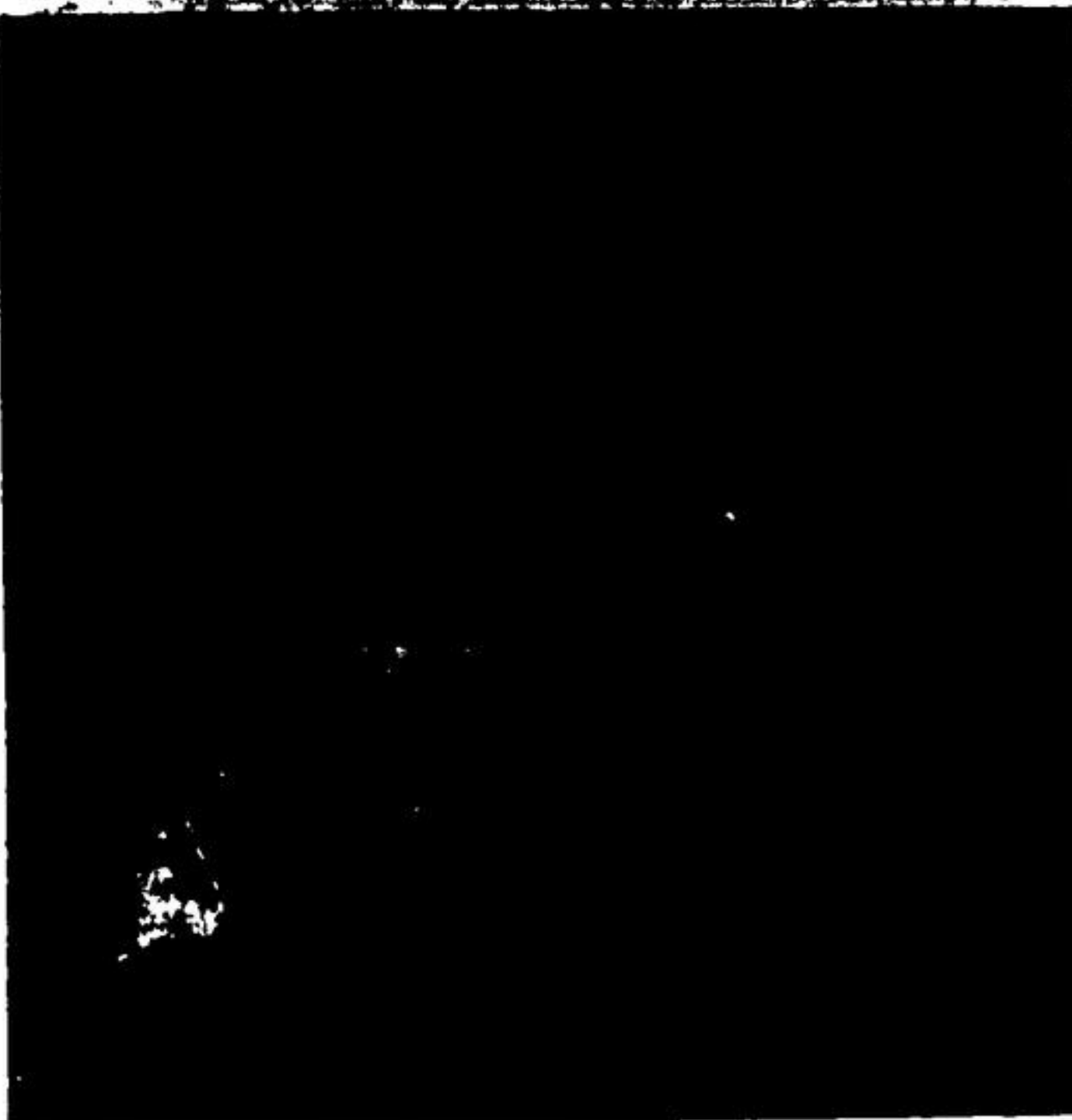
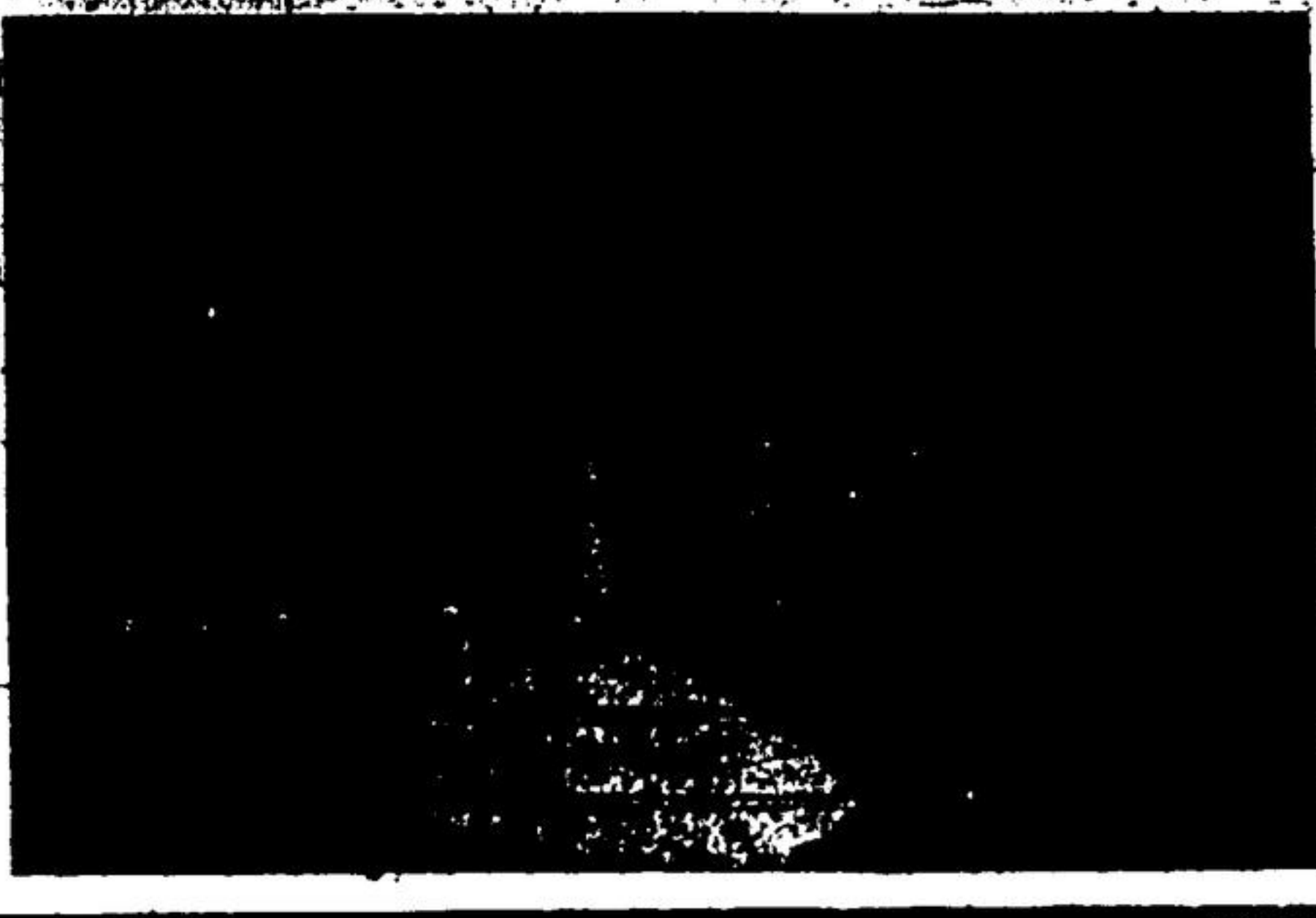
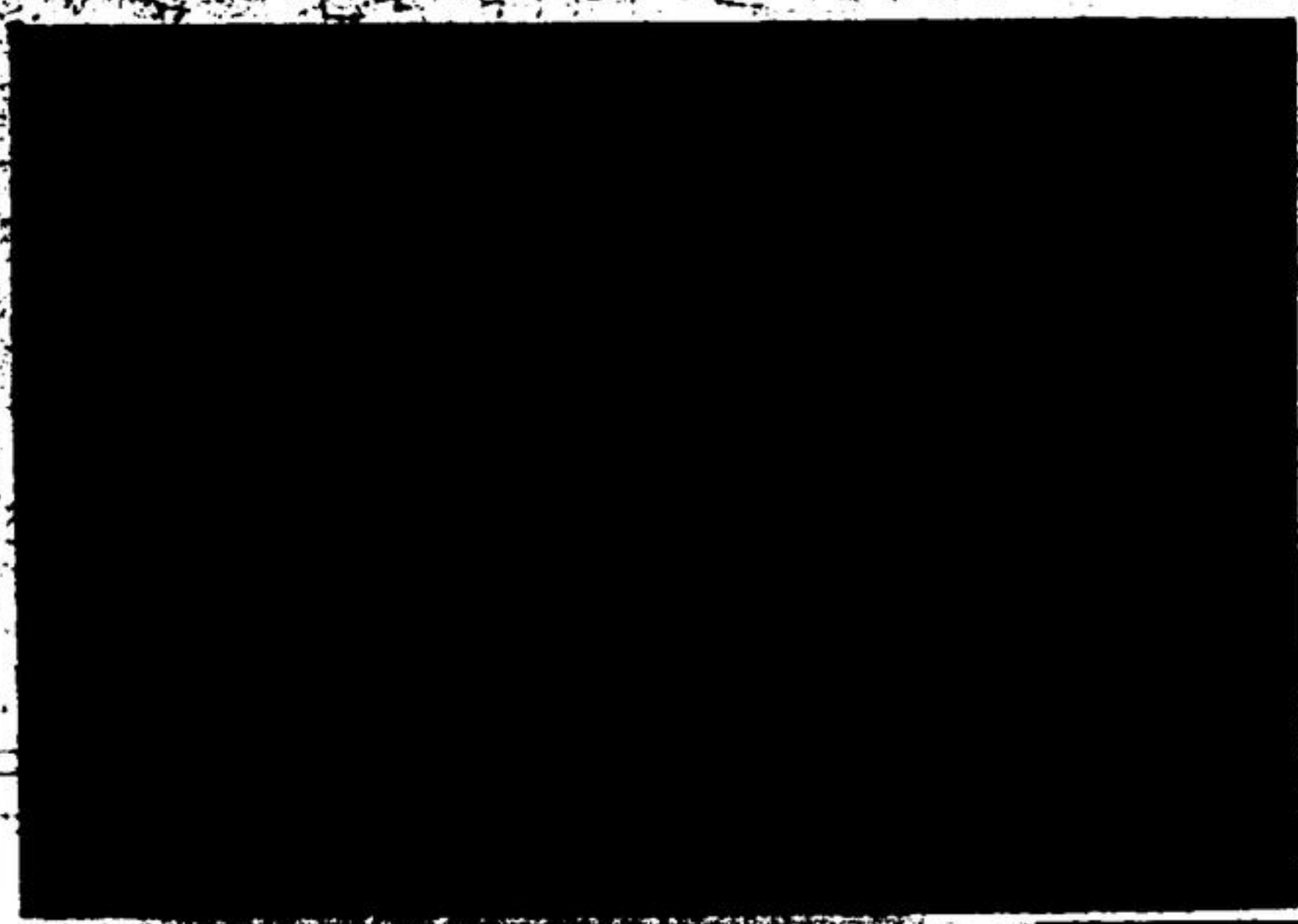

**Halton Welfare Officials Oppose Proposed Scheme**

A report from an advisory committee on child welfare which stated that Ontario had not assumed sufficient responsibility for the welfare of children has been opposed by local county authorities.

Paul J. Jolliffe, director of the Halton County Children's Aid Society, said the report included percentages on permanent wards kept by children's aid societies.

He said the province accounted for 1.3 per cent of the average ward cases in Ontario.

He said that Dufferin County was listed with the lowest permanent ward record, and that Peel, Perth, Welland and Halton counties tied for second lowest.

Jolliffe said this indicated that children's aid societies were doing a preventive job and attempted to reunite parents with their children wherever possible.

For this reason Jolliffe was against the recommendation that the main responsibility in future should rest with the province, even though the local societies would continue with the actual work.

Gordon Gallagher, county warden, said there was no reason for this type of legislation to be hurried through by the province.

He said the Halton County Children's Aid Society is doing a superb job in taking care of children.

Gallagher said that a local children's aid society is a better judge of the needs for its wards than the provincial government which would be in a bad position to take care of the overall need.

He added that too much power was taken away from local administration leaving them to administer only streets and sewers.

The advisory committee on child welfare recommended that all children removed from their parents by the courts should be made wards of the province.

It was recommended that county councils, or groups of county councils, be established as regional welfare authorities responsible for providing child welfare services which meet provincial standards.

At present all matters pertaining to children's welfare have been looked after by the children's aid societies.

The committee appointed by Welfare Minister Louis Cocco calls for the provincial government to strengthen, expand and define more clearly its child welfare services.

Mr. Cocco indicated that this will be done in the new Child Welfare Act.
