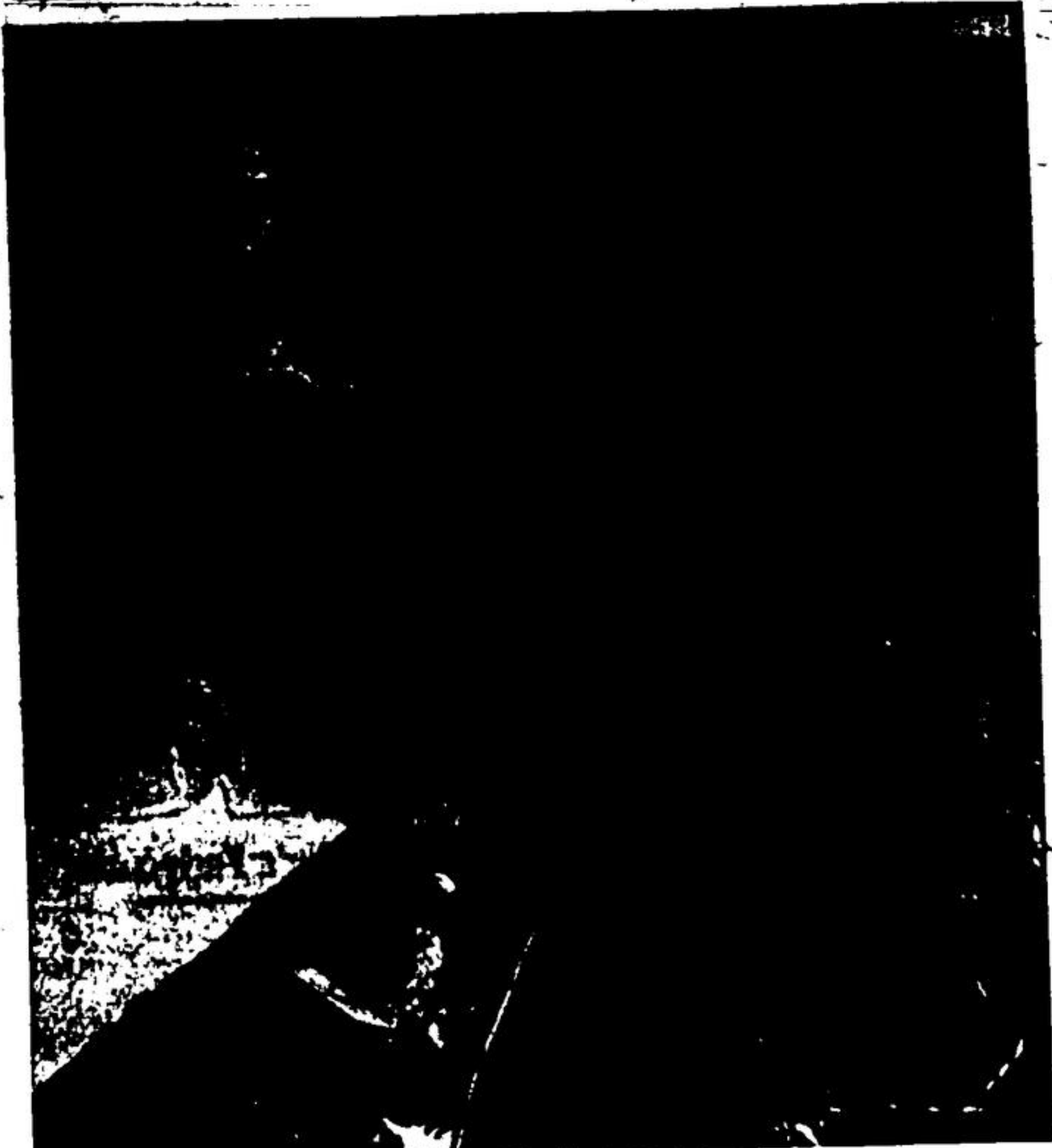

Music is Becoming an Important Part of Education at GDHS

Years ago, music was for the rich but, today, everybody can make it as well as listen to it. It has been recognized throughout the Dept. of Education that music is a subject which can be carried through the whole of High School and into University. In other words, a student can count music as a subject from Grade 9 to 13 and on, if desired.

The complete music department in the Georgetown High School consists of a Senior Band and Choir (Grades 11-13), an Intermediate Band and Choir (Grades 10), and the Junior Band and Choir (Grade 9).

The choirs sing songs ranging from spirituals and hymns to modern-day favourites. In the Bands' repertoire are arrangements from composers such as Bach and Mendelssohn, to contrast with the contemporary composers.

For school assemblies, the Band plays a march or two, giving time for the students to charge into the auditorium. The school dance band, an extra-curricular activity, adds a bit of colour to the musical entertainment. The ten-piece dance band practices on its own time and is led by Mike Baker, a student himself.

Whenever the Drama Club puts on a play, the Seniors Band and Choir entertain during intermissions and, at least once a year, a concert is held for both parents and students. The Seniors help in benefits, as did the Band in the Hospital Wall Musical Show, recently held at the school.

Of course the Intermediate Band and Choir will soon be following these examples. The Juniors, however, are working very hard towards their musical debut.

The ground work for this extensive music department was laid by Dr. Charles Wilson, presently a teacher in Guelph. The equally hard task of maintaining and expanding the department is in the capable hands of Mr. Ivan Long, a former regident

This year Georgetown District High School initiated an Art course into its curriculum. Dr. Shiner, a French and German teacher on the staff, is teaching the grade ten students the basics of the subject.

The school was lucky enough to share the services of Mr. J. Boyes, a graduate of the College of Art, and employee for six years of T. Eaton Company, with the High School in Brampton.

Three afternoons a week, he instructs the upper grades in the use of chalks, water colors, pen and ink, and other such media.
