Two Tractor Trailers, Dump Truck Collided near Hornby

A tractor trailer and a dump truck were involved in a spectacular crash which sent both vehicles down a steep embankment near Hornby, Monday, Dec. 21.

No one was seriously injured in the crash or in the second accident in the same spot while the first was being investigated by police.

Both trucks were travelling in the eastbound lanes of the 401 Highway west of Hornby at the time of the crash.

Drivers John Glarentzos, 31, of Highfield Dr. Toronto, and Andy Tenyehuis of R.R. 4, Bradford suffered only cuts and bruises.

The plunge over the bridge embankment resulted in \$8,000 damage to the transport and \$2,000 damage to the dump truck.

As two tow trucks were hauling up the transport a second tractor trailer in the westbound lane went out of control, jumped the median and struck a police cruiser parked at the edge of the embankment.

The cruiser was forced into a guide post which broke off. The car's front fenders were damaged. Ontario Provincial Police Constable Albert Jordan was sitting in the cruiser moments before it was rammed.

An unidentified man standing on the median was missed by three feet.

The driver of the second transport was Carman Howatt, 28, of Rlyth-Ontario. He was not hurt.
