Harley Proposes that Ambulance Charges Be Government - Paid

Haltom county M.P. Dr. Harry Harley, chairman of the Federal Government's food and drug committee, said last week he favored emergency ambulance services being paid for by existing government-sponsored hospital plans. Dr. Harley said this would mean that emergency ambulance services in this province would be paid for by the Ontario Hospital Services Commission as a hospitalization charge and the costs would be shared 50 per cent each by the Federal and Provincial governments. Dr. Harley's proposal was presented during the past session of Parliament last summer but no action was taken. Dr. Harley said that he would bring up his proposal again when Parliament resumes early in February. The Haltom County M.P. said that emergency, as referred to in his motion, means ambulance requirements as a result of an accident or where the doctor feels that urgent transportation to hospital is necessary. Dr. Harley said the major problem facing ambulance services is finances and that his proposal could remove "in some areas about 80 per cent of the calls are never paid for," he said. Haltom County Warden Gordon Gallagher said that Haltom County Council would establish a county-wide ambulance service for Haltom. The motion was put before county council recently after a man seriously injured on Highway 401 had to wait 50 minutes in freezing weather before an ambulance arrived. The major problem surrounding the establishment of a county-wide ambulance service centers around who would finance such an operation. Assistant Attorney General A. R. Dick has said that the municipality should take some responsibility for a county-wide ambulance service because they receive revenue directly from the provincial highways. He suggested municipalities should contribute money to ambulance services as they would for maintaining the police or fire department.
