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HOSPITAL NEWS

Georgetown hospital patients who have no idea of what insurance they carry and what it pays for are presenting a problem for the hospital bookkeeping staff according to hospital office manager Harold Seckington.

"Many people treated at the hospital as either inpatients or outpatients just aren't too sure if they have to pay for the service," Mr. Seckington told The Herald.

To enlighten people who have never been a hospital patient and are in a fog when it comes to insurance coverage he offered the following explanation.

Ontario Hospital Commission or OHSC Coverage

The OHSC coverage entitles a subscriber to all inpatient treatment at the standard ward level. This includes every service such as x-ray, lab, drugs, medicine, food, staff.

The OHSC coverage with regard to outpatient or emergency service entitles the subscriber to the following:

1. If the treatment given at the hospital occurs within 24 hours of the accident or incident the person who has OHSC coverage will not be billed. Follow up treatment will also be covered by OHSC.
2. If the treatment given at the hospital occurs after 24 hours of the accident or incident this person will be billed since OHSC will not cover the treatment.

The OHSC will cover treatment over 24 hours in the Emergency Dept. If the doctor agrees this treatment or procedure prevented the person from being admitted as an inpatient.

4. The OHSC will cover physiotherapy if the doctor requests the treatment. The OHSC does not cover x-ray, or laboratory services on people who are treated more than 24 hours after the accident.

Blue Cross & Other Insurances

1. Blue Cross if you pay it through your work in combination with your OHSC premium will cover semi-private accommodation. The code on your OHSC certificate will show '33' in top right corner.
2. Other insurances such as Aetna, Mutual, Life, etc. may cover semi-private and private coverage.
3. An "insurance" form is completely processed at time of discharge from the hospital.

Outpatients Service Over 24 Hours

1. PSI will cover 50 per cent of x-ray treatment and patient will be required to pay 10 per cent.

Community College Here? Kerr Wants It Considered

George Kerr, Halton County M.P., is concerned with the institution of community colleges in Halton. He said that an informal committee has already been formed in one county town to set up a private community college.

He said that such colleges can help students decide what direction they should take, after completion of secondary school. Kerr said that a community college would eliminate many students from attending university who are satisfied with a two-year college education after high school.

He said that such a college would be affiliated with an accredited university or college already established. The community college would only provide two additional years of schooling after high school.

Kerr said that if after two years the students would like to attend a university, credits earned at the community college would be valid.

Kerr said that he has also been concerned about door-to-door salesmen.

Kerr, a member of the Consumers Credit Commission, said that door-to-door salesmen had

him would become effective only 48 hours after the sale has been made.

Kerr said that such legislation would allow the householder to think over the purchase before being bound by any contract. He said that such legislation would only apply to persons making term payments. The clause would also apply only to goods sold at a cost of over \$50.

He said the \$50 limit was imposed so that many respectable door-to-door sales firms would not be affected. He listed the names of some firms whose services have become indispensable to the householder and said this their sales should not be curtailed.

He said that such legislation has been discussed in England and passed in the state of California, USA, and found very effective in the latter case. Kerr said that such legislation would protect the housewife who was often unaware of the implications involved after her signature appears on the contract.

He said that a contract made between the salesman or the company he represents and the buyer of the product sold by
