

# Seven Georgetown Teeners At Toc Alpha Conference

Wilma Mason, Jane Hill, Frances Crisp, Randy Hibbert, Gerry Johnston, Anne Draper and Carolyn Freeman from here were among the more than 350 teenagers throughout Ontario who took part of their Christmas holidays to attend the Eighth Annual Ontario Youth Conference on Alcohol Problems.

The Toc Alpha Conference took place from Saturday afternoon, December 27, till Wednesday noon, December 30 at the Park Motor Hotel in Niagara Falls.

Toc Alpha adapted their name from the Greek alphabet and proceeded to work out the meaning. Teach Our Canadians to Assess Liquor by Presenting the Hazards of Alcohol.

Lectures, discussions, demonstrations and recreational activities made up the program. The conference opened with greetings and an introduction of the Toc Alpha Executive, by Rev. E. W. Smalley, General Secretary Ontario Temperance Federation. Among Sunday speakers were Mr. Thomas A. Knott, Director of Youth Work, Ontario Temperance Federation who spoke on "The Urges to Splurge," Rev. Gordon Winch "The Padre to the Pub" spoke about the Nature of Alcohol, and Dr. Gary Cormack, Psychiatrist, Ontario Hospital, New Toronto spoke on the dangers of Alcohol to the Human Body.

Monday speakers were: Dr. Marvin A. Block, Vice-President of the National Council on Alcoholism speaking on the Peculiar Problems of Teenagers Drinking and The Alcohol Problem Facing North America Youth; Rev. Kenneth Baxwell, Assistant Editor to the United Church Observer speaking on Youth in the New Age; Brigadier Joshua Monk, Director of Harbour Lights which is a Salvation Army group who help those who are willing to be helped; Rev. J. R. Mutchmor, former United Church Moderator spoke about The Menace of Liquor Traffic and stated that Liquor companies should be forced to pay damages to victims of drinking drivers.

Tuesday Speakers were: Mrs. N. H. Parker, Eastwood Centre, Hamilton talked about Building for Security; Chief James Mackey, Metropolitan Toronto Police Department spoke on The Drinking Driver and Law Enforcement; Magistrate D. A. Pappel talked on Alcohol and the Juvenile; Valarie Chamberlain's topic was What Toc Alpha Means to Me; Don Parsons, Past President of Toc Alpha gave a report comparing life to a JIG-SAW PUZZLE.

Wednesday speaker was Rev. John Linton D., General Secretary Canadian Federation on Alcohol talked about The Question of Liberty. Devotions were held every

morning for those who wished to attend and regular group discussions of twenty to twenty-five persons were very informative.

The Conference ended with a Farewell Luncheon and a speech by Rev. Robert Short on Youth Work "Committee O.T.F. on WHERE DO WE GO FROM HERE?"

**FOURFOLD PURPOSE**

Toc Alpha teenagers have adopted the following fourfold purpose:

(a) To convey factual, scientific information of the alcohol problem which is of interest and concern to youth.

(b) To offer other young people a better understanding of the alcohol problem through personal observation of the social implications, on the problem.

(c) To provide wholesome fellowship through recreation and social activities.

(d) To encourage the development of a youth movement to help fellow-teenagers find satisfying substitutes for drinking through a program of recreation and education.

Major emphasis is being laid on Toc Alpha as a movement, a working force of teenagers throughout the Province of Ontario to promote alcohol education.

# LET'S PLAY BRIDGE

It has been said that 25 per cent of the contracts at bridge are made or lost on the opening lead. I cannot verify the exact figure but I do know that quite a few hands can be made with a favourable opening lead that would normally be doomed to defeat if the opponents lead a different suit.

This I am very surprised that no declarer made the following hand for surely some West would lead the diamond king. I know that I would have if I had been in West position.

Dealer: West  
Both sides vulnerable.

North	South
S-A J 8 8	S-K 10
H-K J 6 2	H-10 9 3
D-J 4 3	D-10 8 6 3
C-8	C-K 10 8 5 4 C-A J 9 3

The bidding:  
S-7 3 2  
H-A Q 7 5 4  
D-A 5  
C-Q 7 2.

Three declarers ended up in 4 hearts although probably not on the bidding that I have suggested. The first round of bidding is straight forward. West can double at the first opportunity to show a hand with support for any suit that partner may bid. Having passed with a hand that cannot be an opening bid, three bids available, West has three bids available.

West's hand is a diamond suit with four hearts. One spade left the opponents enter the bidding at a low level. Three hearts can be passed. Since his hand is worth at least 14 points in support of hearts he could jump to four.

As I said earlier, I would lead the diamond king from West's hand. And I am sure in the three times that it was played that some West would make the same lead.

With this lead declarer can and should make his contract. The trick is to count to ten. One spade - five hearts - two diamonds give eight and either two club ruffs or two more spades make ten.

Win the diamond with the ace and lead a trump to dummy's king and a trump back to your ace. Since trump don't break you cannot ruff clubs. Do not take another trump out yet. Now lead your low diamond. West wins and leads a spade. You might as well try the eight-but-East-takes-the-10 and returns the trump. Win in dummy and discard a spade on the diamond jack. Now the ace of spades and a spade ruff set up two good spades in dummy. Use dummy's last trump to get there.

Declarer tries to set up spades by repeated finesse he will lose a diamond, a club and two spades. I am afraid that's what happened to our declarers.
