

Says Township Fire Share Greater Than Georgetown's

In an unusually short inaugural speech Reeve Georgetown of Esqueping made no promises or forecasts, but merely stated, "With the same co-operation which has always existed in Esqueping Council, we shall cross each bridge as we come to it."

Following the official swearing in by Clerk K. C. Lindsay of all the members of council, Rev. R. J. Stables of Glen Wilkes conducted a devotional period.

In the ensuing business meeting, J. Sullivan, Inspector for the Halton County Health Unit discussed a low lying lot on the 8th line and No. 8 side road with Council.

The Esqueping Planning Board has refused to allow any building on this lot until the Health Unit gives its approval. Mr. Sullivan pointed out that Health Unit approval would be withheld until certain recommendations were carried out, since he felt no septic tank or tile bed could be installed until at least two feet of fill, and possibly more were dumped.

Council felt they could do no more until the Health Unit approval had been received.

Claimants are James Coyne Lindsay and Ninian Graham Lindsay, administrators of the estate of the late Ninian Flockhart Lindsay.

The land in question amounts to 1.478 acres in the east half of Lot 27, Concession 4, Esqueping township.

Georgetown Area Rabies Free, Says Department

Dr. W. J. McCabe, of the Health in Animals Division of the Department of Agriculture confirmed Monday that the Georgetown area has remained free of any evidence of rabies although remote cases have been discovered in other parts of Halton and Peel.

Dr. McCabe said the dreaded animal disease often makes a come back at this time of year. He said it has been some time since a rabies case has been reported in the Georgetown vicinity.

It's still a good rule for parents to warn children to stay away from any animal, domestic or wild, which starts acting peculiar.

Commenting on a statement of Georgetown's Reeve Elliott that Esqueping paid too low a share of the cost of fire protection, Clerk K. C. Lindsay pointed out that Esqueping's rate for protection in the Georgetown fire area is 1.28 mills, while Georgetown itself pays only 1 mill. "In proportion we pay more," claimed the clerk. "In addition we supply one truck."

Smoothing things over, Reeve G. Leale stated that Esqueping Council had always got along well with Georgetown on the question of fire protection, and would continue to do so.

Assessment Commissioner Art Benton reported that \$161,875 in assessment had been added since the assessment roll was made up in September.

Councillor G. Currie warned of careless hunters in the area, demanding, "Are we going to allow hunters running all over our farms for a \$3 non-resident fee?" He blamed people from outside the area.

Clerk K. C. Lindsay pointed out that "No Trespassing" signs could be erected on any property, then trespassers could be prosecuted. "The only other remedy," continued the clerk, "is a by-law prohibiting the use and carrying of firearms in the township."

Classes Started For Pre-School Retarded Children

Classes for pre-school age retarded Georgetown children has been started here by the North Halton Association for Retarded Children.

Mrs. Peggy Treahy, president of the Association said the class was held in a private home Monday but once organized she hopes it will be held Tuesdays and Thursdays of each week. Two children attended the first session, but if the number gets too great the Association will appeal to a local church for space.

Mrs. Treahy said that as well as making an appeal to parents of pre-school retarded to have their child attend she is also appealing to anyone who would care to give volunteer assistance. She said the children will be started on educational toys and toilet training which is required before a child is admitted to Sunshine School for Retarded Children at school age.

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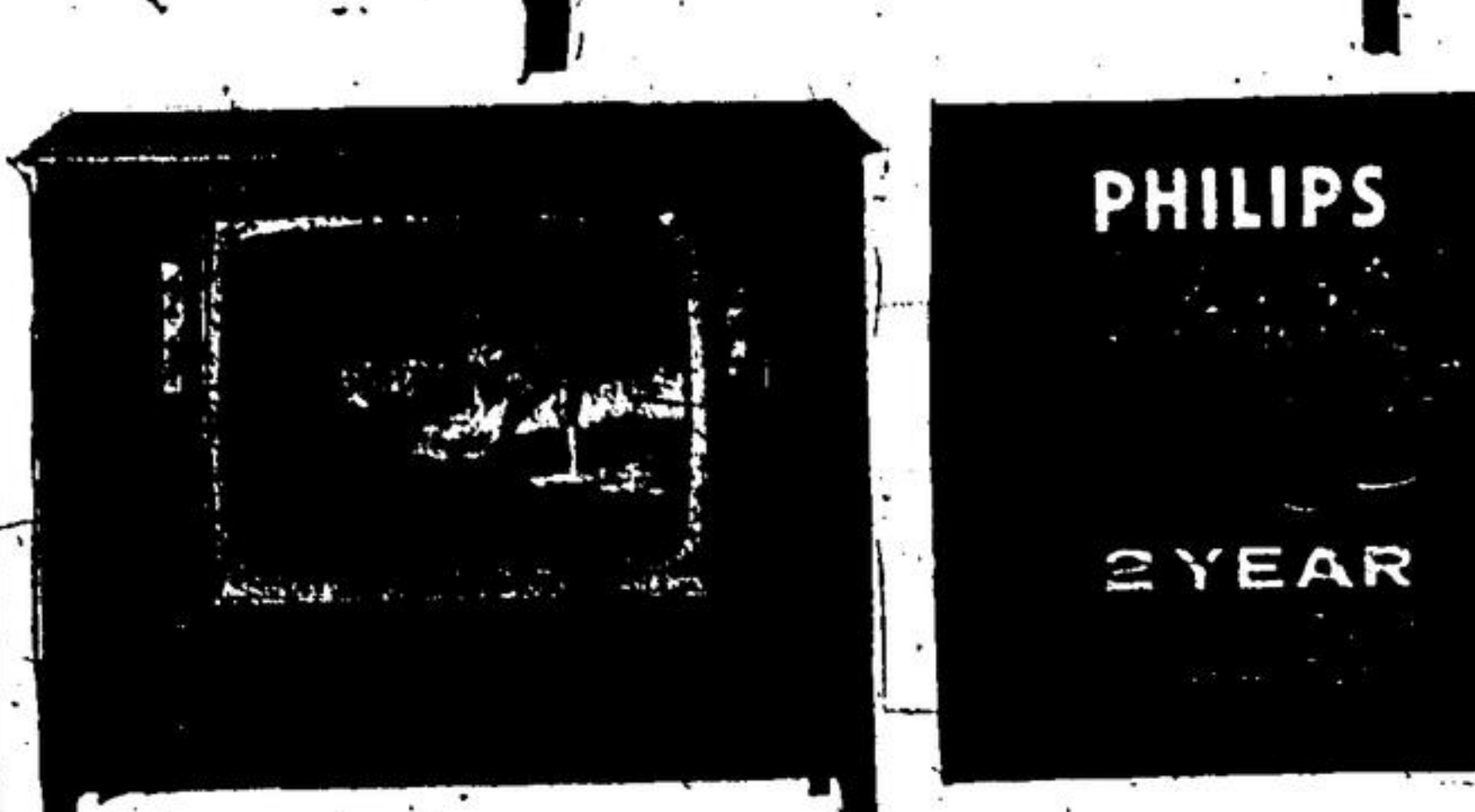
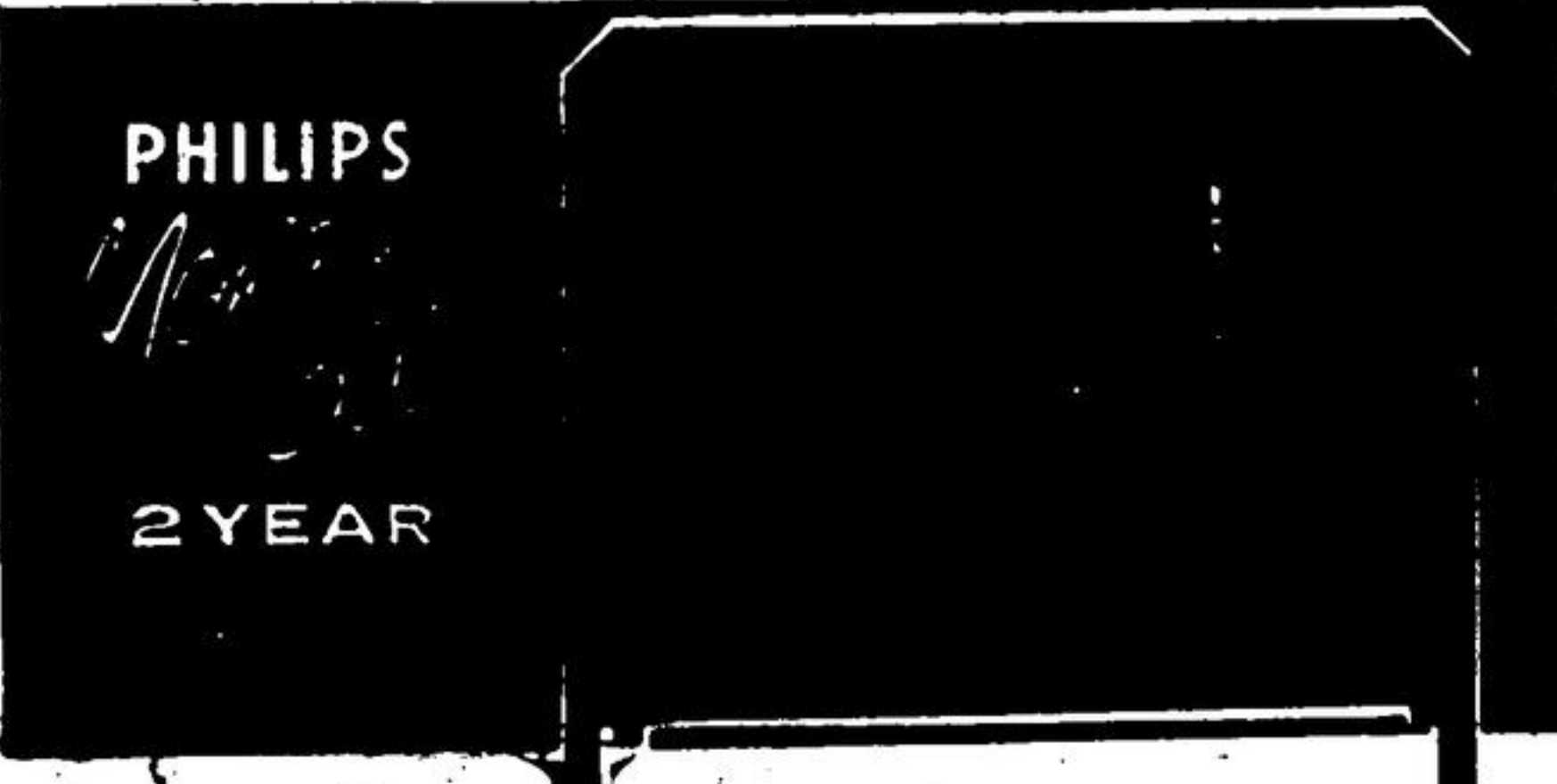
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
