Georgetown council has turned down a request from the Ontario Mayors and Reeves association to join in a mass protest against the Bell Telephone Co. in a hearing before the Board of Transport Commissioners which will set the permissive level of earnings for the company.
 The action, presented by a solicitor for the municipalities, would cost the town approximately \$120, it was estimated. A motion to join was defeated at Monday's council meeting when only Deputy Reeve Hunter and Crs. Smith, Powers and Hewson voted for it.

Hold Requiem Mass for Assessor James Bilborrow

Requiem Mass was conducted in Holy Cross R. C. Church last Thursday morning for James Michael Bilborrow, 38, of 6 Rezway Drive, a member of the town assessment department and former police sergeant. He died January 4 at Toronto Western Hospital, following a heart operation.
 Mr. Bilborrow was born in Lacashire near Wren Green, a son of Mr. and Mrs. Robert Bilborrow. He came to Canada in 1952, farmed with Mr. and Mrs. Spencer Wilson at Noval for eighteen months, then purchased the Gracey farm at Weston and later the Goddard farm at Dixie. He returned to Georgetown in 1955 to join the police force which was formed to replace the provincial policing system, and rose to the rank of sergeant before ill health necessitated him giving up the job two years ago. At that time he became an assessor. He had completed the first year assessor's course at Queen's University.
 He had been a member of Halton Police Association and was first president of the Georgetown association when it was formed and had passed the sergeant's course at University of Western Ontario. He was a member of Halton Assessor's association.
 He leaves his wife Margaret Threlka, whom he married fourteen years ago, two sons, Sean and Bruce; his father, Sean and a brother in Australia and a brother in Australia. He is survived by Pr. RECIPE OF THE MONTH
Sausage Peacherino
 Serves 5 easy; Economical
 1 lb. sausage meat
 1 1/2 tablespoons minced onion
 2 cups soft bread crumbs
 1/2 teaspoon salt
 1 teaspoon poultry seasoning
 Dash of pepper
 1 egg, beaten
 10 canned-Canadian free-stone peach halves, drained
 Whole cloves
 1/2 cup peach syrup
 Combine sausage, onion, bread crumbs, egg and seasonings. Form into ten balls. Bake in shallow pan in moderate oven (350 degrees F.) 25 minutes. Remove from oven. Drain off fat. Drain peach halves and stud with 4-6 cloves. Place a sausage ball on top of each peach half. Add syrup and return to oven for 20 minutes, basting with syrup.
