

Halton Second Smallest But Has Top Assessment

Halton County is the second smallest of the 43 counties, not to mention the 11 districts, in Ontario.

However, if it has no distinction for its size it does for its assessment, which is the highest total assessment of them all.

In other words it's the richest.

Lincoln County, the smallest county, has a total assessment of \$172,000,000. Halton County's Lincoln by almost a hundred million dollars. Its total assessment adds up to \$271,000,000.

Its population (1963 figures) is almost the same. Lincoln has 128,000 while Halton has 129,000. In size, Halton is just a bit larger.

Lincoln, the smallest of all the counties, has 333 square miles of land, while Halton has 363 square miles, or about 22,000 acres. Lincoln's county seat is St. Catharines.

The largest is Hastings County with 2,323 square miles. Its seat is Belleville.

Halton has seven local governments within it. Two of them are townships and five are towns.

It used to have nine local governments set up, before Burlington amalgamated with Nelson Township (1966) and Oakville with Trafalgar Township (1963).

The county is governed by a council of 14 men, two— a reeve and a deputy reeve from each of the seven municipalities.

Mark was brought home from the hospital for Sick Children, Toronto, on the weekend where he has been since the accident happened in Burlington where he was holidaying. Bandages have been removed and he uses what vision he has as much as he can, but reading often.

"We played a game of chess this morning (Monday), and just being able to do little things like this has lifted his spirits," Rev. Wood said.

Mark experienced a second or two of perfect vision when he woke Monday morning, but objects soon became blurred again though not quite as fuzzy as the day before.

New By-Law Sets Changes For Parks Board Nominees

There will be at least one new face on the 1965 Board of Parks Management, according to a by-law passed by council Monday.

The board, which operates the arena, will have seven members, at least two of whom must be councillors. And all members will be appointed annually.

Since its inception in 1943, when the town took over the arena from a private company, there has been a 6-man board, two appointed each year for three year terms, with the mayor an ex officio member.
