This Saturday, January 23 will be the last game of regular league play in Saturday morning hockey. On Saturday, Jan. 23 a full (5) week round robin play-off series will begin. In this 5 week series each team will play four games which will be used to decide final standings. The four top teams will go on into semi-finals, remaining five teams will be eliminated.

The following procedure will decide final standings. Total points decide; if tie, most wins decide; if still tied, most goals for; if still tied, goals against.

The semi-final and final will both be two game total goal series.

The schedule for each of the play-off games will be published in this column each week and further a complete five week schedule will be posted on the notice board in the front lobby of the arena. Do not use the schedule now in your possession after this Saturday, Jan. 23rd.

In fairness to all concerned and to keep all teams playing as long as possible and still finish up the season with a semi-final and final series the above procedure was agreed upon at a meeting of the executive and commissioners on Monday, Jan. 11th.

Richmond Misses Top Slot Ball League Stays in OBA

Georgetown's Bill Richmond was defeated in a bid to be elected president of the Halton County Baseball Association in Waterdown Saturday — but he was re-elected vice-president of the organization which governs intermediate and minor ball in the county.

In the race for the president's chair, Earl Nicholson of Waterdown was his second term by defeating Richmond. Richmond edged out Terry Meiri of Burlington to retain the vice-presidency.

A proposal to withdraw from the Ontario Baseball Association was rejected.

Andy Anderson of Oakville, whose motion triggered discussion of the proposal, charged that the provincial group was not properly organized.

Anderson, former general manager and player with the intermediate Oak. contended that the OBA had lost control of its playoffs.

After rejecting Anderson's proposal, the meeting decided to propose a plan at the OBA convention in March designed to streamline provincial play-downs.

At that March meeting, a Halton County delegate will propose that a convener be appointed to supervise playoffs in each classification or age grouping (senior, intermediate, junior, etc.)

Delegates at Saturday's meeting agreed that lack of supervision from the OBA was permitting teams in playdowns to "drag out" the series.

"Any one of us here will try to drag out any series if his team has only one pitcher and he is allowed to," Will Rodgers of Hamilton pointed out.

About 50 delegates from Brampton, Burlington, Campbellville, Georgetown, Hamilton,



ation approved a motion by OMAA president Burrows that would set up a committee under the next executive to help promote baseball.

The association rejected a proposal by Anderson that an attempt be made to have the OBA reinstate its A Major category.

Anderson contended that such a move would put more teams into the playoffs. Last year, teams formerly competing in A Major were forced into senior competition.

At the OBA meeting, set for MAR. 18 and 20 in London, the meeting decided to propose Richmond and secretary-treasurer Reg Locke as members of the provincial executive.

Curling Popularity Spreads With New Industrial League

A unique kind of industrial curling league which operates much like an industrial bowling league has been in operation at the North Halton Curling Club for the past two seasons.

The league, made up for the large part of people new to the game, includes 3 rinks from Varian Associates, 3 rinks from Standard Products, and rinks from Plax, Domatic, Provincial Paper. Another rink, to make it an even 8 team league is made up of local golf professionals Doug Bruton and Max Foster and other golfers.

Most of the team members are not members of the North Halton Club, but pay fees for playing the team game as a member of their plant team once a week.

"It will operate just like a bowling league," club manager Doug Bruton told The Herald. "There'll be a windup banquet with awards at the end of the season, and although I am acting as league manager right now I expect we'll be able to have an election later on and turn the league's operation over to a slate of officers."

Bruton said that he has tried to arrange it so that each team has at least one experienced player. He said the other members of the rink become familiar with the rink and out of the games the experienced member would probably fade out of the picture and allow another "green" player to get acquainted with the game.

Bruton said the league is the result of a few casual inquiries by people in industry. He said notices were placed on bulletin boards in local plants to get an indication of the response and it was sufficient to draw up the league.

The games are played between 1 and 3 o'clock and many of the players have been bringing their wives and children to watch them.

As well as providing an inexpensive means for people interested in curling to sample the sport, the new league affords a way for North Halton to introduce potential club members to the game, and provide a channel into the regular club curling.

Some 32 players are taking part in the new setup.
