"I understand there are only 20 children who would enroll - this would be most economical to have half a classroom, still needing one teacher," commented Dr. O'Dwyer.

Double Losses. "Kindergarten is never a paying proposition," added Trustee Stan Walsh, "and this way we would double our losses."

Board member J. Nieuwboer felt that the class would probably have to be scrapped in the fall anyway, since the space would be needed for other grades. "Why did these children not come to the existing kindergarten in the first place?" asked Mr. Nieuwboer. "It is only sensible to prepare for bilingual classes in a bilingual kindergarten," replied Mr. Primeau.

"But is it not the idea to learn English," returned J. Nieuwboer. Mr. Primeau went on to ask for figures showing the cost of the present kindergarten and the estimated cost of the proposed one.

Father Ogter DeVent felt it was impossible to get a grant on the salary of a teacher who only taught half days.

Financially impossible. Robert Thompson, re-elected chairman for this year, pointed out that it was financially impossible, and when a kindergarten would have demanded expansion a few years ago, the

Board simply cut off kindergarten altogether. "We have room in kindergarten right now for 20 pupils and would be happy to have them, since it is more economical with a full classroom," added the chairman.

"If your child was bilingual wouldn't you want to provide a bilingual kindergarten," demanded Mr. Primeau. "When we couldn't afford a kindergarten before, we cut it out," retorted Paul Legge. "We all had children of kindergarten age at the time," he added. "Besides, what's the difference between cutting out if you can't afford, and not having it if you can't afford it," he concluded.

When the motion was finally voted on, it lost six to two with only Mr. Primeau and Ed LeBlanc in favour.

Two attendance officers. In the normal first of the year appointments W. H. Breckridge was reappointed to the Georgetown High School Board, Mrs. Dora Sutherland was reappointed to the Library Board, and Ed Malison was reappointed secretary treasurer of the School Board.

Investigate This Week Says Police Commission

An investigation of the town's police department called for by council in mid-December will get under way this week according to a letter from the Ontario Police Commission read at council Monday.

All nine council members voted for the investigation in a recorded vote at a council meeting December 14.

Since then there has been an exchange of correspondence between council and the commission regarding the starting date for the probe resulting in the letter read Monday.

The investigation came about after councillors expressed concern over the number of resignations from the Police Department, failure of one newly hired constable to stay a week with the force and of another to show up after being hired.

Major Gibbons termed the policing inadequate and claimed dissent on the force.

Supervision, Entertainment Promised at New Club Mojo

Three Georgetown youths who call themselves B&B Promoters are bringing teen dances back to the Arena Rose Room. But don't call the Friday night hops teen town or teen party - the new tag is Club MOJO and the new theme is good supervision and good entertainment.

"Broke" that's how the last three people who tried to run dances in Georgetown ended up," a B&B spokesman commented. "Every person who has tried to provide this town with a half decent dance has seen it fold because of poor attendance. This poor attendance was induced for the most part by faulty supervision, the presence of a few rowdy minors, and of course the absence of good entertainment."

"Right there are three good reasons why the next dance to be held in Georgetown Arena won't fail," he said. Supervision of the newly formed Club MOJO will be handled by B&B Promoters with support from the Georgetown Police Department, who have agreed to handle what is probably the most important factor in poor attendance at a young people's dance, the few rowdy and usually intoxicated minors who would rather devote their energy to causing trouble than

enjoying an evening of clean, wholesome entertainment. "Measures have been taken to eliminate this sort of thing," the promoters claim. "We feel the attendance will be strong and constant once the youth of this town discover the quality of entertainment to be offered in coming weeks."

Entertainment to be supplied by B&B includes such personalities as The Shyars, The Big Town Boys, Martha and the Vandettas, The Supremes, The Centurics, Larry Lee, Dianne Warwick, and Rumpin Ronnie Hawkins when bookings permit. The first session, with the Shyars, is Saturday night because the Rose Room is not available tomorrow night.
