Airs Case in Disputed Hydrant Charge by Town

January 23, 1965

Dear Sir:
I find your report covering
my appearance before George-
town Council incomplete and
out of context. Your headline
makes me appear like a naugh-
ty boy who does not want to
accept the services provided by
a fatherly and benevolent
Council, and should apologize
to his Worship the Mayor, for
being brazen enough to speak
up for his rights.

Therefore, I hope you will
publish this letter in which I
am trying to repeat my peti-
tion as presented to Council on Mon-
day, January 18th.

1. I protested against the sud-
den and arbitrary charge of
\$150.00 per year for a fire
hydrant that has been in the
same location for over forty
years. During all these years,
none of the tenants of the build-
ing that my Company now oc-
cupies have been charged for
having a hydrant in front of
the building. This hydrant was
considered a public service
which is accorded every tax-
payer of Georgetown without
extra charge, until last year
when Council decided to make
up for a deficit in the Town's
Water Department.

I also mentioned that we
were fortunate enough not to
have used one drop of water
out of said hydrant during our
occupancy of that building.

2. I further pointed out that
said hydrant is located less
than 200 feet from a private
dwelling at 80 River Drive,
while the next hydrant is more
than 500 feet from said dwell-
ing. Therefore, it could not be
classified as private, and re-
stricted to be used only for our
property.

3. Said hydrant is approx-
imately 300-500 ft. from the
main manufacturing and stor-
age area of our company and
almost useless, as the fire
fighters would use the second
hydrant located on our prop-
erty which is closer to the afore-
mentioned areas, should the
occasion arise.

4. The right of way on
which hydrant in question is
located has been a public thor-
oughfare for many decades
and is, by the way, the only
access to the property of
Wood-Way Manufacturing Com-
pany Limited. Therefore, it can-
not be classified as our private
road.

5. As the location of our
main manufacturing and stor-
age area is never more than
100 ft. distance from the Cred-
it River and providing for the
use of the second hydrant pre-
viously mentioned in point 3,
I feel that our property would
have adequate fire protection.

After presenting these facts
to Council, I proposed the fol-
lowing three solutions:

1. Return to the Status Quo
and forget the charges for the
hydrant.

2. Deed the right of way in
question to the Town, thereby
legalizing a situation that has
been existing for close to a
century.

3. Have the Town remove
the hydrant from our property
and place it approximately 30
ft. away on River Drive which
is now a public road.

So much for the business
with the fire hydrants.
I then went on to give Council
my opinion on how Indus-
try is treated in this town and
that is was no use to ad-
vertise this town to prospective
Industry in glowing colours, be-
cause any Industry considering
moving to Georgetown would

get its references from busi- ness already located in town.

I, for one, will not be for
Georgetown and tell them that
the fathers of this town will
bend over backwards to help
them with the various problems
facing them.

"Treating established Indus-
try and Businesses fairly, is
the best and cheapest advertis-
ing for any town."

This, Mr. Editor, is in ex-
cess what I said last Monday
and you should not be sur-
prised that I am not too happy
with your reporting.

May I also say that I would
not be at all surprised to re-
ceive a bill from this Town,
charging me quarterly for the
blue spruce tree located in
front of our office, because 70
years ago an employee of this
town helped to plant it. I am
quite sure that someone will
dig up the records to justify
this charge.

By the way, I pay my water
charges regularly, therefore,
your headline "HYDRANT NO
USE, WON'T PAY CHARGE
FOR WATER" is slightly inac-
curate because my argument
was against an arbitrary charge
for a service accorded every
taxpayer in town, and not a
punish charges for water.

May I close, by again ex-
pressing the hope that you
will see fit to publish this let-
ter in your next edition, and
