TEMPLETON HERE FOR PARLIAMENT

"While the Dominion Party was hardly in student elections at Georgetown High recently, the Nationals gained supremacy in total and will form the government when a modal parliament meets here next month.

Secondary school students from many centres in Ontario and Quebec will take part and neighbouring members of parliament have been invited as guests.

At a leadership convention last Saturday, Stewart Saxe, who led his Dominions to a 67% win in Georgetown, was chosen official leader of the opposition. Another GDHS student Roger Smith was elected party whip. And David Blaney was appointed deputy speaker.

Guest speaker at the model parliament, scheduled for February 20, has been announced as Charles Templeton, prominent in the leadership contest for provincial Liberal leader.

NO WORD YET SUDS PRICE INCREASE

Local beverage room operators haven't yet received the proposed notification of a hike in the price of bottled beer, but beer drinkers need not disturb any dormant hopes the price change is coming. So is the reduction in the size of the draught glass.

Bottled beer sold in beverage rooms will be raised to at least 35 cents from the present 28 cents. Draught classes will hold less beer but will still cost 15 cent. It will mean draught drinkers will get about a cent and-a-half less beer in the new glasses than in the old straight-sided tumblers.

A Georgetown beverage room operator told The Herald he expects the new glasses by February 15.
