**Georgetown is Rabies-Free But Cases Reported Close**

Rabies, the dreaded disease in animals that can turn docile pets into potential killers, is apparently creeping toward Georgetown from both north and south. Cases were reported last week as close as Alton to the north and the 9th Line of Trafalgar at North Service Road to the south.

Dr. W. J. McCabe of the Department of Agriculture, Health of Animals Branch, has issued a warning to school-children not to handle or pet wild animals they may come across, or to handle the carcass of any dead animal they may find.

Dr. McCabe reports that although there have been no reported cases of rabid animals in the immediate area, the incidence of rabies is tied to the rise and fall of the fox population in the area, which according to present figures is at a particularly low ebb.

"When the population of foxes is high the number of cases of rabies is high; and conversely when the population drops, incidence of rabies drops," said the doctor.

One dog in the Alton area died from coming in contact with a rabid animal, and three other dogs have been quarantined because they had contact with the dead dog.

These dogs are now tied up and quarantined for a three-month period while observations are made to see if they have contacted rabies.

"Because of the cost factor involved," said Dr. McCabe, "farm animals such as cows and horses are not usually inoculated against rabies, although family pets, such as dogs and cats can be."

It earned its nickname because the children live and receive treatment in a village of brick bungalows rather than a hospital-like building.

The staff of 300 includes 28 Logopedists and evidence of Speechtown's worth is that an average of three children graduate into a normal life daily.

In June of 1964 the International Board of Directors unanimously adopted the Institute of Logopedics as its unified society wide service project.
