

# Georgetown Fair had Successful Year Finances Show Society in Healthy State

## Ken Ella Re-Elected Président for 1965

The annual meeting of the Georgetown Agricultural Society which sponsors Georgetown Fall Fair, was held in Georgetown Community Hall, on Thursday evening, February 4.

Summing up the operations of the fair after his first year as president, Ken Ella thanked all those who had helped make the Georgetown Fair in 1964 one of the best, the directors, exhibitors, the municipalities and the public who supported the show.

The society's highlight was the financial statement presented by the treasurer, E. W. Lawson. It showed that grants and donations totalled \$3,608.19, and a prize list of \$3,356.78 had been paid in full. Horse racing, which is not included for agricultural grant purposes, also cost the society \$561.00.

Cash receipts amounted to \$2,305.00. A balance on the year's operations amounted to \$942.57.

The treasurer also reported that since the statement was prepared, well over \$100 had been spent on conditioning the race track at the park, which would bring the balance down by that amount.

Reports were given by directors on the various phases of the fair and some suggestions made for another year. Criticism of the midway operators was made, and it was decided that they be asked to "clean up" before operating the show.

Short reports were given on the District No. 5 meeting, and it was noted that the Milton Society had invited the district to meet there in the fall.

At the election of officers following the meeting, Ken Ella was returned for his second year as president, Keith Webb, 1st vice president, Don Wingrove, 2nd vice president and Mrs. George Ironside, secretary; Walter Pops, auditor.

E. W. Lawson declined the nomination for treasurer, and a new treasurer will be sought in the near future.
