EDITORIAL COMMENT

Don't Forget Halton

Initial announcement of the proposed hew provincial plection boundaries has one important omission for Halton residents.

A map reproduced in the daily newspapers last week shows the county split down the middle into two ridings. In other counties, there is a generous use of north, south, east and west as designation. Neighbouring Peel, for example, will be divided close to the lakeshore into Peel North and Peal South.

But to our surprise, and consternation, we find that Halton will be named Oakville and Burlington.

We register a strong objection, and hope that the more satisfactory term of Halton East and Halton West will be used. The county has a proud history, and residents should strongly protest loss of identity.

A second objection which will be shared by residents in the north-east corner of Esquesing, is their inclusion in the Burlington riding, rather than Oakville. Undoub-

·tedly, the parliamentary committee which is planning the changes, tried to split Halton into two more or less equal halves. But to have a narrow riding, with an Kahapad Wedge come in behind the sectors portion will suit no one and will be most confusing to future candidates and voters.

It would be much more sensible, in pur opinion, to do in Halton what has been done in Peel - have a smaller lakeshore strip and a larger North Halton riding. Geographically, the county has always been divided in this manner. , Georgetown has more ties with Esquesing, Acton, Milton and Nassagawaya, than it has ever had with the lakeshore communities.

It is a matter which could well be discussed by North Halton urban board which could approach the proper sources before it is too late.

Efforts of town council, sparked by Mayor Gibbons, in attempting to reinstitute a magistrate's court here are to be commended.

Court Needed Here....

There are few communities of this size which do not have this important legal fac-Ility close at hand. Yet for some time, all cases involving local people have been heard at Milton or Oakville.

It is an imposition on many people the accused, the witnesses and the Georgetown police, to name some of them. It has meant that our town is often without min-Imum police protection while members of the force must be away to attend court. And
