

Support Georgetown Request For Local Magistrate Court

Milton Town council is supporting Georgetown in its efforts to establish a magistrate's court.

Milton Councillor Charles Johnson said Georgetown wants to stop the practice of sending its court cases to be heard in Milton because it is time consuming.

"It is unfair to bring witnesses and policemen — especially on their day off — to Milton," the councillor stated.

Council agreed to send a letter asking the attorney general's department to give Georgetown's request "early consideration."

A copy of the letter is to go to George Kerr, Halton County M.P.P.

Councillor Johnson is Milton's representative on the North Halton Urban Board. At its recent meeting, representatives of Georgetown asked the support of other municipalities in the north part of the county.
