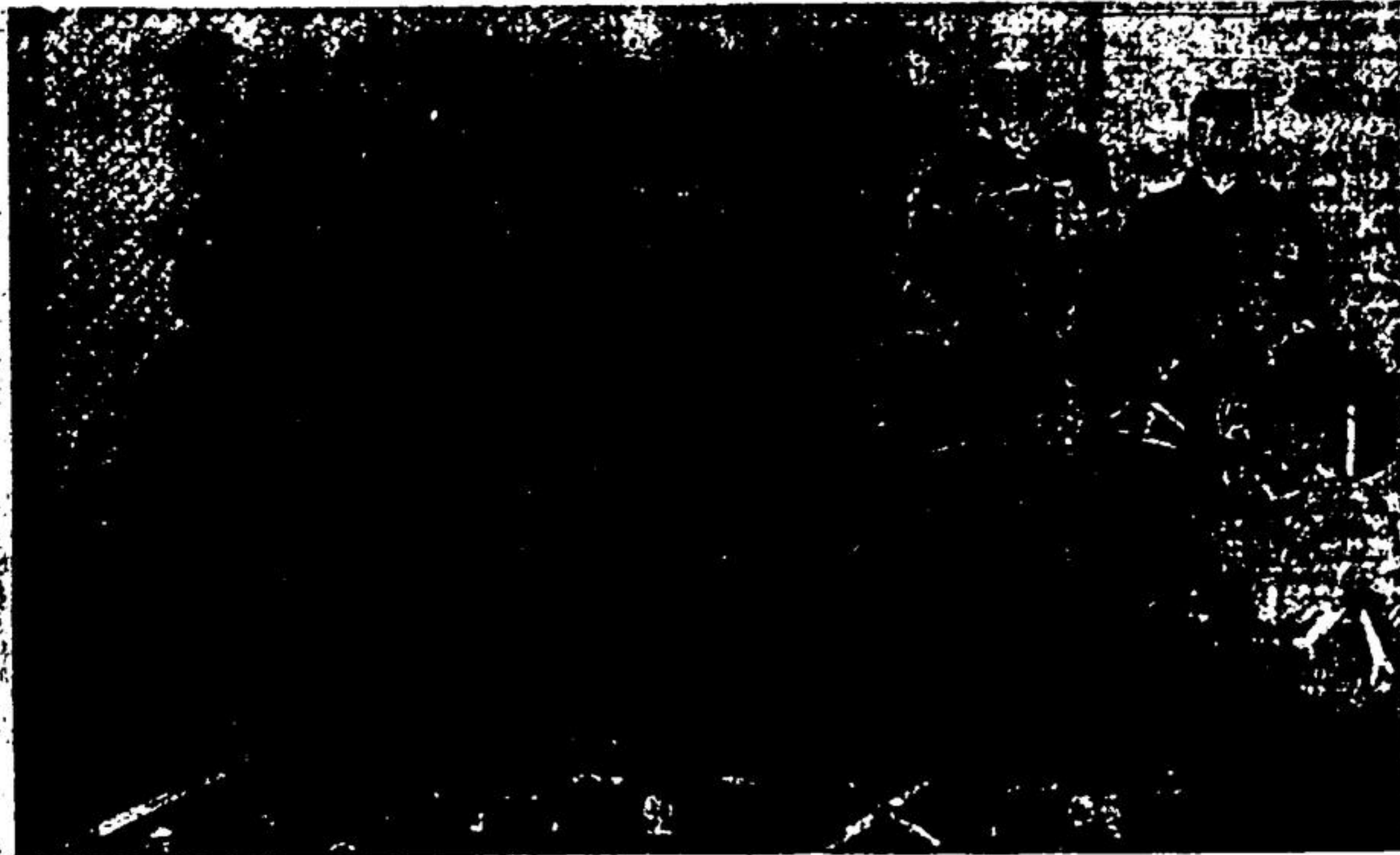


# Stung Twice by Hornets Beavs Back Into Playoffs

Georgetown Junior C Beavers have backed into a playoff berth in the OHA Central League. The Beavers, though dropping both ends of a week-end double header with Orangeville Hornets clinched a playoff spot Monday when Brantford beat Paris.

A league meeting Monday night determined details of the regular schedule while the top eight clubs enter eliminations, the first four having the choice of who they meet. The first round will be a best of 7 set, the second round a best of 3 series, and the final 4 of 7.

The Beavers have four games to play, one each against Orangeville and Hanover and two against Milton.

The Beavers look a 5-3 jolt from Lou Vucinato's Hornets in Orangeville Thursday night, and took a physical beating in bowing 4-2 Sunday.

Some stock taking at the end of the second game revealed an unhealthy Georgetown club. Five regulars, Jan Popiel, Dave Sheppard, Murray Marchmont, Wayne Riddall, and Burke are all nursing hurts, but the last three are still sound enough to stay in the lineup.

The only good news emitting from the Beavers is that Brent Telford, injured at the start of the season is expected

back in the lineup this week.

Orangeville grabbed a 3-1 first period lead Sunday. Pilon scored unassisted at 8:47; Stan Hope from Workman at 10:32, and Workman from Watson at 19:12 for the Hornets. The lone Beavers goal was Campbell's from Hay and Riddall at 11:18.

Georgetown notched the on-

ly middle period marker, Presswood from Hay and Selby at 11:32 but Hornets held Georgetown scoreless from that point and added number 5 at 18:41 of the third period. Workman from Dempsey.

The officials called 37 penalties, 19 to Georgetown.

Popiel and Sheppard didn't play and Riddall and Burke

left the game in the second period: Riddall with a sore hip and Burke with a shoulder injury.

Campbell scored 3 and Popiel 1 in Thursday's loss. Terry Hay assisted on all three. The winners got their goal from Workman (2), Pilon, Peavoy and Davidson.

### Baseball Group Seeks \$1200 for Minor Ball

"The groundhog and the baseball men come out of their winter hiding places together" quipped Wm. Richmond, Vice-President of the Georgetown Baseball Association, as he presented their proposed budget to Council, Monday night.

In asking the town's support Mr. Richmond pointed out that last year the Association received \$800 from the town, rather than the \$1200 they had requested.

He predicted a deficit of \$1800 for the coming year, if no grant was forthcoming from the town.

"The league has grown from six to thirty-nine teams in the last four years," contended Mr. Richmond, "with over three hundred local boys involved."

He reminded Council that a definite answer is needed before the April 1st deadline for entering teams in league contests. The Vice-president of the Association also offered help in fixing up the washrooms in the park, which he claimed

were a disgrace last year, and an embarrassment for visiting teams.

He stressed the need for more men to come out and help, in some cases the older boys are helping with the umpiring for the younger ones. "We've got lots of boys, but not enough manpower," he concluded.

"How many more increases can we stand," asked Finance Chairman John Elliott. While lauding the work of the Association, and pointing out that Mr. Richmond had frequently put money out of his own pocket, Reeves Elliott felt the Board of Parks should be asked what they feel they could allow towards the baseball association.

It will be discussed further at a Recreation Committee Wednesday night.

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
