Handel's Music and Life Reviewed, W.I. Music Day

Introducing the bill for first reading Mr. Rowntree said:

"For a number of years there has been growing concern in respect to permanent total and permanent partial disability pensioners under the act who received their awards in years past when the benefits of the act were at a much lower scale and wages upon which these benefits were based also were at a substantially lower level."

"It is now recommended that all pensions be increased to the level of 75 per cent of average wage which is the current basis and in addition that minimum earnings be increased to a level which will reflect current average earnings to a greater degree."

The minimum pension for a totally disabled pensioner will become \$100 a month under the formula developed even though current earnings may be below this level."

This was one of several changes in the Workmen's Compensation Act proposed in the amending bill.

Hospital Admitted 173 Patients in January

One hundred and seventy three adults were admitted to Georgetown and District Memorial Hospital during the first month of 1965, a report on the hospital's operation in January presented to the board last Thursday disclosed. Births in January numbered 26 and there were 3 deaths.

The daily average patient load was slightly less than 51 adults, and 7 newborn. On an average seven-and-a-half per cent of available beds and 42.1 per cent of available bassinets were occupied.

Adults and children in hospital average of 8.9 days, and newborns 7.5 days last month.

Operations performed in January included 11 major, 31 minor, and 173 tonsillectomies and adenoids. The Laboratory processed 3,124 units of work, and the number of X-ray examinations tallied 428. Three hundred and twenty physiotherapy treatments were given to patients, which meant an average of 20 treatments per day.
