President Gail Collett and Registrar Chris Toat were business to Kinettes wives to explain the function of Kinette.

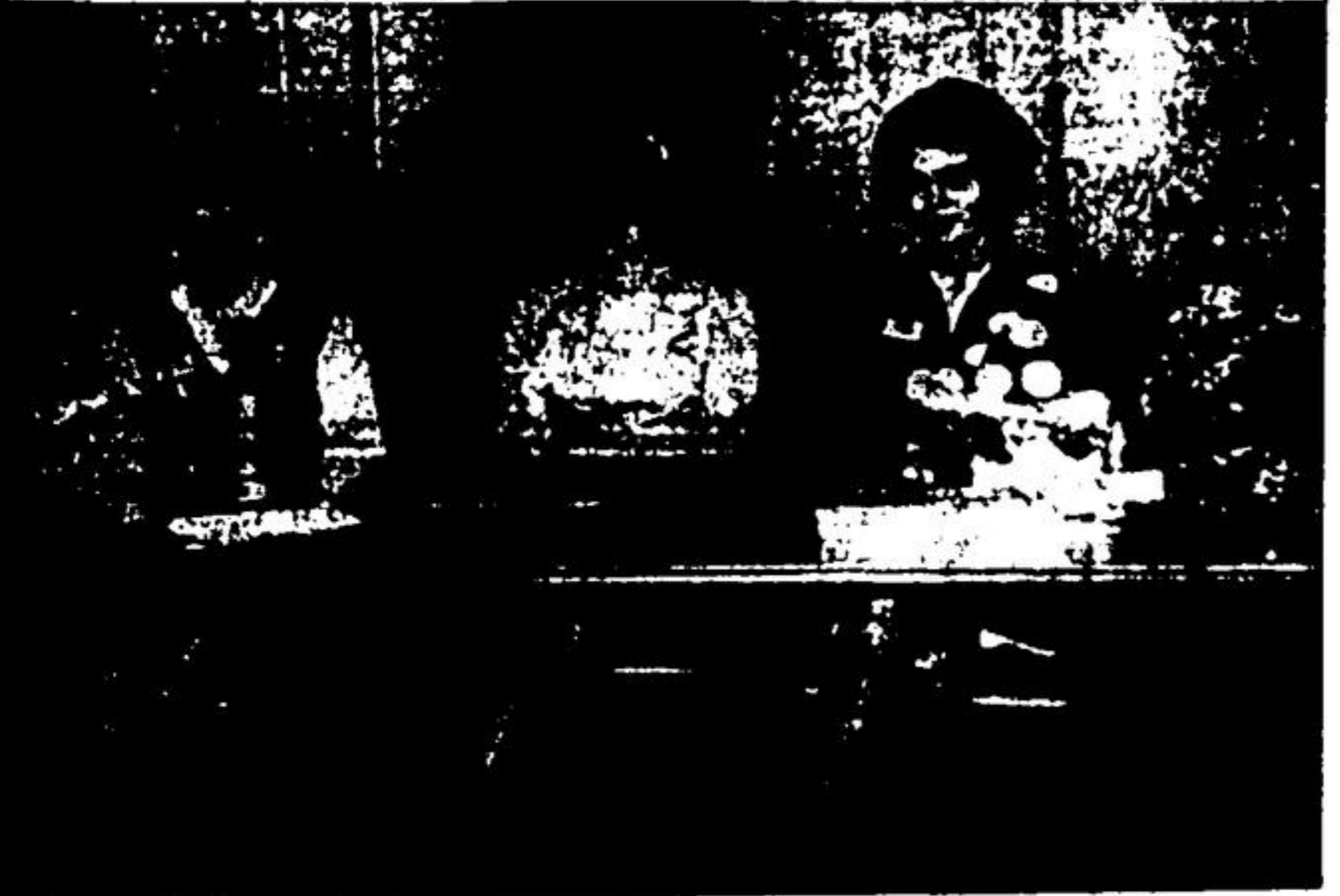
A bridge and euchre game will be held after Easter with proceeds to go to the Kinettes' New Project. Chairman is Nancy Ellis.

## New Telephone Book to Feature County Museum

You load sixteen tons and what do you get? Not enough paper to put out this year's new telephone directory.

This weighty little item is on its way to customers in Georgetown.

According to H. A. Blachford, Bell Telephone manager for the area, 31,467 copies of the Brampton-Georgetown and surrounding territory directory are being distributed this year. This is an increase of 4,448 copies over the previous year. A total of 5,250 will be sent to customers in Georgetown, an increase of almost 100 over last year.

Every year Bell employees spend hundreds of hours listing telephone subscribers' names and numbers and updating one of the world's best read reference books.

Mr. Blachford also cautioned customers to check the numbers in the new directory and where necessary make changes in their "Blue Book" of telephone numbers. This will help avoid the annoyance of wrong numbers. If you need a new blue book you may obtain it by calling the telephone business office.

The manager pointed out that the introductory pages were a wealth of information and should be checked to see if any different procedures were outlined for making calls. "Emergency numbers" should be recorded in the blank space," he said.

This year's cover features a sketch of the Halton County Museum at Kelso. In keeping with the other 61 directories the Bell will print this year, the cover is a new salmon pink shade.

It is hoped that all farm organizations in Halton will devote a portion of at least one meeting during 1965, to the topic of Safety. "Farm Falls" are being stressed this year. Over fifteen hundred people die of falls each year in Canada.

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## Five Day Enrolment for P.S.I. Offering

The P.S.I. sponsored Halton County Community Health Centre will re-open for enrolment Monday, March 1.

This year's offering will be of short duration - Monday, March 1st through Friday, March 5th. No applications will be accepted after the close of date.

The P.S.I. plan is widely recognized as the answer to the problem of prepaying physicians' bills. It provides first coverage for physicians' services at home, in the office or in the hospital. The plan is for surgery, x-rays, anaesthesia, obstetrical care and any other benefits.

All permanent residents of Halton County are eligible to enrol. There is no age limit, enrolment fee, no medical examination or statement of health is required and coverage is provided for chronic and pre-existing conditions.

P.S.I. spokesman, Mike King, told The Herald that an

application and brochure outlining the plan has been mailed to every household in Halton County. By completing the application and returning it together with payment covering three months, subscribers will have coverage effective April 15, 1965.

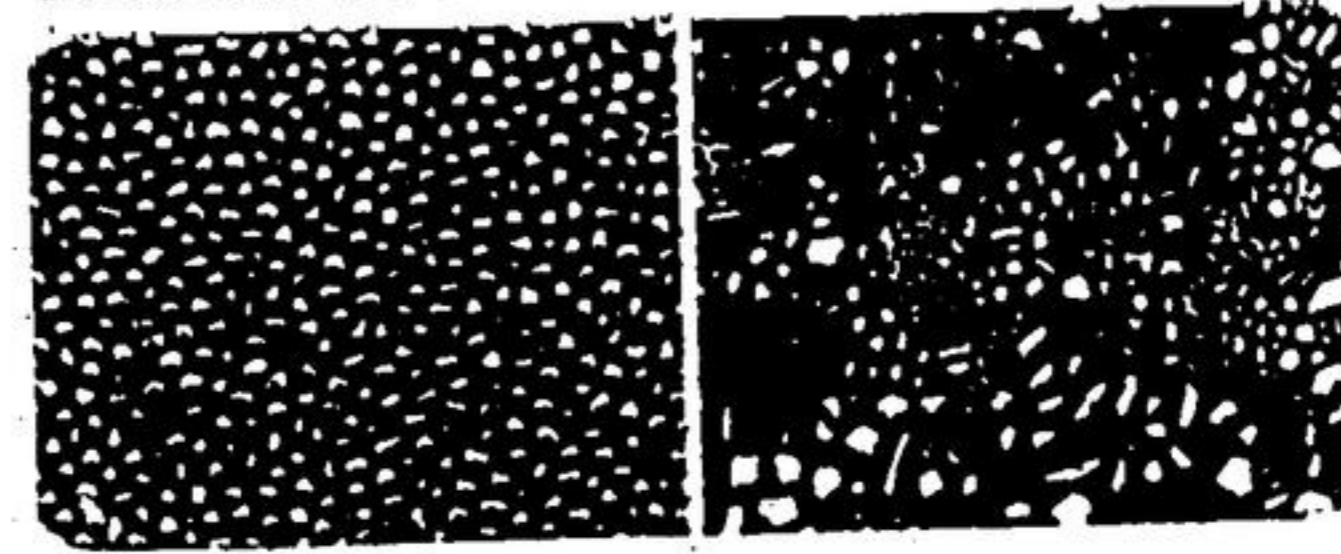
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
