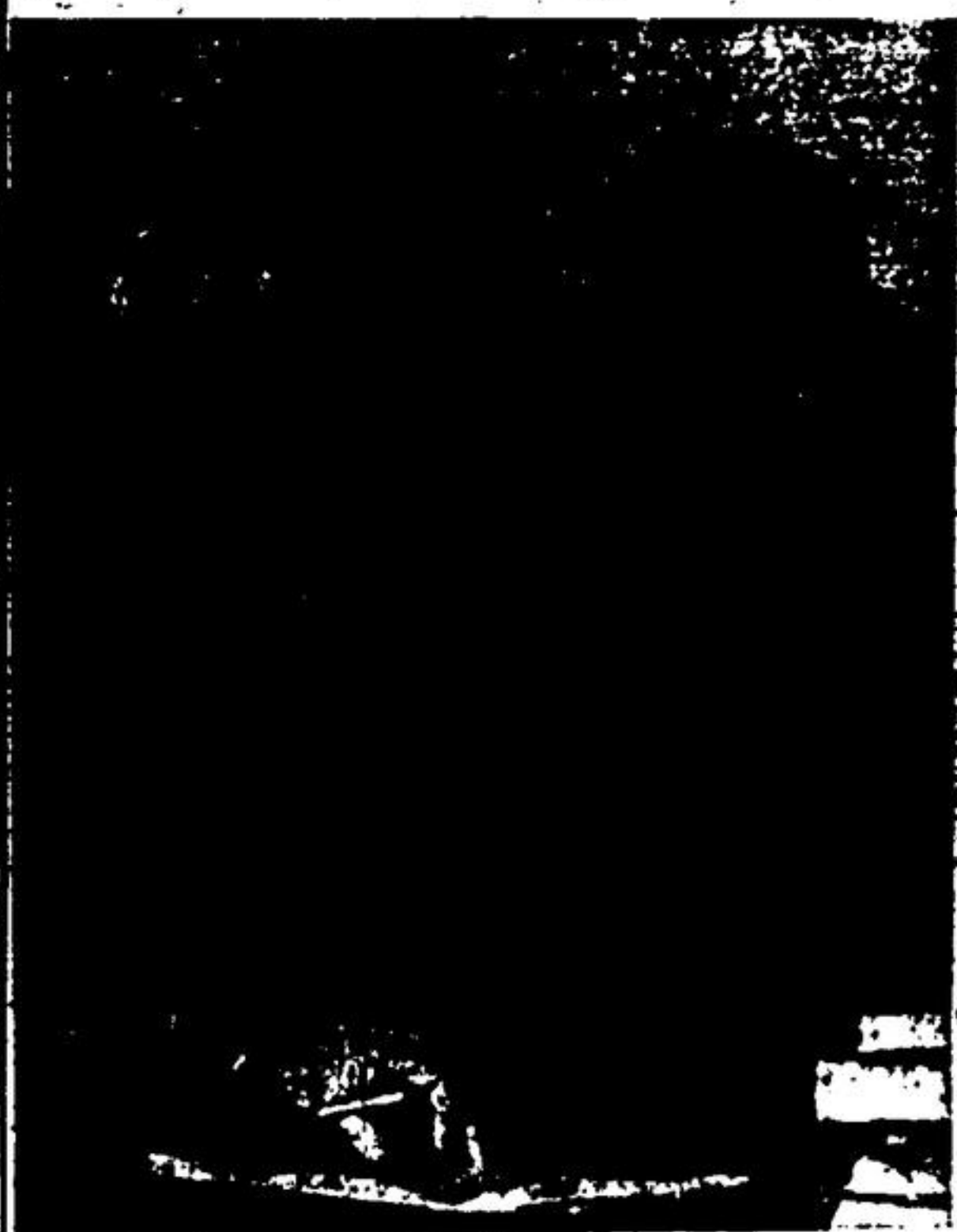


The Art of Verbal Thrust and Parry on Model Commons Floor

Knox Presbyterian Hosts Women's Day of Prayer

When Canadian women joined those of 150 other nations in a day of prayer for peace and Christian unity in 1964, more than \$70,000 was received in offerings. The major part of this was spent for Bibles and other literature to further the work of various Christian groups both in Canada and abroad.

This year, the first Friday of Lent, March 5th, has been chosen as World Day of Prayer. Locally the service will take place in Knox Presbyterian Church and baby sitting services will be provided. Women from seven churches will participate.

The theme of the 1965 service is "What Doth the Lord Require." It has been written for the occasion by Mrs. Jesse Jai McNeil of Pasadena, California, the first woman to receive the citation of "Layman of the Year" from the Detroit Council of Churches.

The offering from hundreds of World Day of Prayer services across Canada makes possible substantial grants to a large number of organizations. Braille and Talking Books for the blind, hymn books for Foreigners, etc.

A hand occurred at the Action Bridge Club last week in which a free finesse for the declarer cost him the contract. In this case, I call a finesse a free finesse, since declarer could not take the finesse himself — he was void in the suit. The point I wish to bring out is an old one — don't make a play you don't need or don't play before you plan.

Here are the hands.
Board No. 3.
Dealer — South.
East — West vulnerable.

North

C-J 10 7 6

West East

I have been appalled, as I am sure everyone else has, at the flooding of the Credit River in Glen Williams.

It seems to me there was plenty of time for the proper authority to do something to alleviate the conditions of the river, as there was flooding there at Christmas. Some people were forced out of their homes on Christmas Day. The freezes up later left huge ice cakes all around their homes ever since. Yet nothing was done about it. Surely they must have expected another thaw!

It was ironical that the flood and the rejection, by the Federal Government to build the six dams and reservoirs, to control flooding of the Credit Valley, appeared in the same edition of the Georgetown Herald.

The people of Halton should use the flood in Glen Williams to influence the Federal Government to change their mind in regard to building the dams and reservoirs to control flooding in future of the Credit Valley. This year's flooding, more than anything else could, has proven it is essential.

It will be necessary for every serious-minded adult to write to the Federal Government in order that they co-operate with the Provincial Government in building his series of dams and Reservoirs, to prevent future flooding of our communities.
