

Fans Wait Out Hydro Break, See Beavers Win

Georgetown Beavers jolted Milton Merchants with four goals in the first ten minutes and then went on to handle their traditional rivals with ease in an OHA Junior C hockey game here Sunday that was interrupted by an hour-long hydro break. Beavers scored twice more in the middle period and posted three goals in the final frame for a 9-2 rout.

The intermission between the first and second periods was extended by an hour when a break in an out-of-town hydro feeder line created black-out. Most of the 400 paying customers waited it out.

The game was the last home game of the regular schedule and put Georgetown in position to see up fourth place with a win in the final league game in Milton tomorrow night (Friday).

The Beavers now own a 17-13-1 record for 35 points. The league includes 11 clubs.

Lane scored once in the first and twice in the third.

Other Beaver scorers were Murray Marchment (4th), Doug Selby (34th), Don Norton (17th), and Presswood (12th). Jan Popiel (18th) and Dave Sheppard (5th).

Selby from Campbell and Illy started things after just 40 seconds. Marchment from Popiel upped it a notch at 3:30. Norton struck from Lane at 8:32 and Lane knocked in Norton's pass at 9:53.

Here best goalie Oultbert, in a solo thrust at 8:06 of the second period to put Milton on the scoreboard, but Georgetown erased that one and added to the lead before the twenty minutes was out. Ron Presswood scored from Hiddall at 2:10, and Jan Popiel from Lane and Norton at 13:29.

Milton started the third period scoring. Prentice the marks man from Legree at 8:02, but that was their limit. Lane exploded for two more to put Beavers way out of reach, the first unassisted at 7:35 and again from Popiel and Hooper at 10:25. Dave Sheppard ex-

tended it to 9:2 when he deflected Glen Cooper's drive into the top of the Milton net at 14:55.

Beavers played in Orangeville Thursday and came away with their 16th win, a 4-3 triumph over Lou Yudin's Hornets. Selby scored a pair, Lane and Terry Hay the others for Beavers. Stanhope, Workman, and Pelon tallied for the losers.
