Cadets Lower Ensign Last Time at G.D.H.S.

The Red Ensign was lowered and the new Canadian maple leaf flag raised in a ceremony at the Georgetown and District High School Friday. The lowering of the Ensign and hoisting of the new flag were performed in the centre of a hollow rectangle of high school cadets in front of the school.

The Red Ensign was folded ceremoniously by two cadets and presented to their chief instructor, Capt. Archie Roberts. It has since been placed in a display case in the school.

The ceremony took place at 11:45 a.m. Students were dismissed early so that they could witness the ceremony.

At writing time three of the six Red Ensigns still flying at this time last week had been replaced. Police Corporal Urges Safety Council Be Formed

The regular meeting of the Local Council of Women was held on Friday, Feb. 19 at the home of Mrs. R.C.T. Paul, Mill St.

Mrs. Paul, the newly elected president was in the chair, and after opening the meeting with a call for silent prayer, she outlined some of the activities and projects planned for the coming year.

Correspondence, minutes and financial statements having been dealt with the opening programme item was the presentation by Mrs. D. W. Baxter of the report of the Canadian Association of Consumers. This report was a special Anniversary number and set forth the major accomplishments of the C.A.C. from the time of its inception in 1947 until the present. This was of special interest to Council members who have supported the work of the C.A.C. from the beginning, and who have given special attention to it in all programmes.

Mrs. Paul then introduced the guest speaker, Corp. Scott of the local police force, who gave an illustrated talk on Safety. Corp. Scott dealt with the topic under three divisions: Safety, Past, Present and Future. He outlined the beginning of the safety programme in the local schools at the time when only two schools were in operation nine years ago, and traced the development of the programme until the present time when there are approximately 3,000 pupils in the town's elementary schools. In addition to its concern for the children the programme aims to create a safety conscious adult public. In this connection Corp. Scott stressed the urgent need for the formation of a local Safety Council.

Corp. Scott's talk was comprehensive and informative and was greatly enjoyed by all his hearers.
