Minister Says CVCA Has Responsibility in Flood

The problem of flooding in Glen Williams did not reach the ears of the Provincial Premier last Wednesday, but did reach the ears of the Minister of Municipal Affairs, Mr. J. W. Spooner, last Friday.

M.P.P. George Kerr introduced Reave G. Leslie, his counsel, T. Van Sickle, Esquire's lawyer, and Clerk K. C. Lindsay to Mr. Spooner, who made it plain that the township had no responsibility in the Glen flooding. He stated that the sole responsibility belonged to the Credit Valley Conservation Authority, to whom the Provincial government had made a grant of ten thousand dollars to clean up the ice in the Glen.

Also on the recommendation of the Minister of Municipal Affairs, council appointed a committee, consisting of Tom Hill, William Korrick, and Roland Haines, to have an appraisal made of the damages. Then they are empowered to have a public canvass for funds. For every dollar collected the Provincial government will contribute a dollar.

At present time, it looked like the three man committee was down to one - Tom Hill. There seemed to be confusion but Clerk K. C. Lindsay felt that letters received from Roland Haines and William Korrick indicated their resignation.

Mr. Hill stated to the Herald "I haven't resigned, the door is still open."

Refuting a statement in a daily paper, K. C. Lindsay said council made it plain they could canvass from Halifax to Vancouver if they want, not just in the Glen. In addition the clerk-treasurer pointed out that the minister of Municipal Affairs had made it very clear it was a self help proposition.
