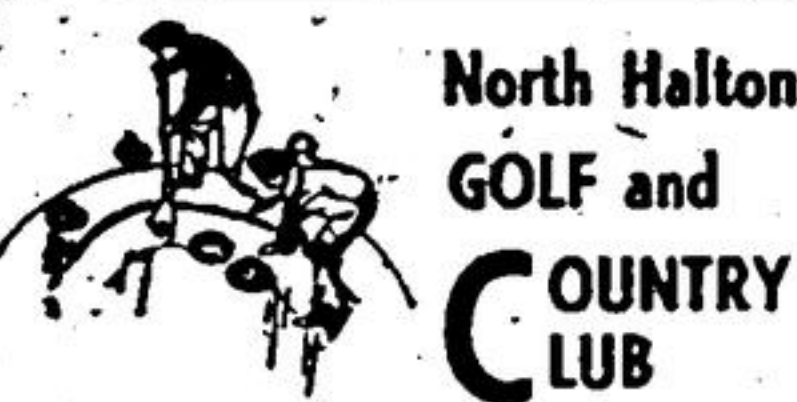

There were 19 minor penalties, 10 to Georgetown and 9 to Dundas.

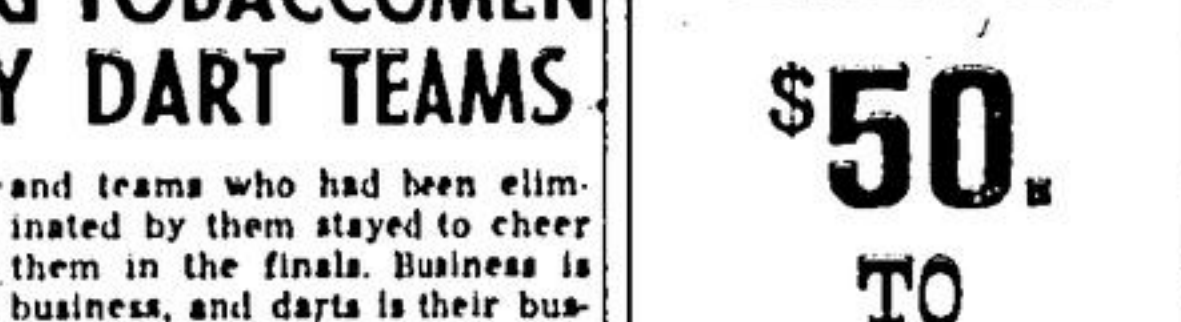

Kerr Pushes for Plaza Parking Lot Rulings

Halt County MPP George Kerr has recommended that the provincial legislature draw up a bill on laws governing privately-owned parking lots within the province.

Plazas, are used as drug strips and magistrates are unable to convict offenders under the present legislation.

He said that if such legislation were brought forward on a provincial level it would benefit every municipality in the province and would particularly curb plaza incidents in Hamilton County.
