'Offensive Interference' Weir Call Kills Beavers

Georgetown Beavers were the fall guys when an Ontario Hockey Association referee perpetrated a costly foul at the front of a crowd of 500 at the first OHA Central League Junior C playoff game here Sunday afternoon.

Weird call came at 18:52 of the third period with Georgetown and Milton locked 0-0 and apparently headed for overtime. The official foul was allowed the Milton Merchants the extra attacker and they used it to advantage snapping the tie with less than a minute to go.

Beaver sniper Doug Selby was the player directly degraded although as it turned out the whole club suffered by it. Selby was sent into the clear on a pass at centre. Two Milton players latched onto him as he crossed the blue line and he was manoeuvred by the net without getting a shot away.

The referee whistled the play down as the entangled trio hit the backboard obviously a holding or hooking call, but jaws dropped open all over the arena when the official signalled Selby to the bench. The referee labelled his invention "Offensive Interference." The Canadian Amateur Hockey Association Rule Book doesn't contain the penalty.

The paying customers were still in a state of stunned shock

when Milton's Marshall fired a hard, rising shot from just inside the Beaver blue-line to snatch the win.

Georgetown led 2-1 at the end of the first period. Milton opened it when McDuffie scored at 1:51, but Don Norios erased that at 2:44 from Lane and Popiel, and Selby pushed Beavers into a goal lead at 12:24 from Marchment.

Selby built it to 3-1 from Campbell at 11 seconds of the middle period, and Terry Hay added a 4th from Selby and Campbell 1:45. When the period ended Georgetown's edge had been reduced to 4-3 as Wildfong and Prentice closed the gap with goals at 6:20 and 10:53.

Norton's second goal made it 5-3 at 1:15 of third, but in a little over 2 minutes it was deadlocked. Bertoli tallied at 2:08 and Hore at 3:38. Terry Lane picked a bottom corner at 7:25 and Beavers went in front, but Marshall evened things with his unassisted marker at 12:25.

The winning marker came at 10:22, just 30 seconds after the bad call.

The best 4 of 7 series resumed last night (Wednesday) in Milton. The third game is in Milton Friday night and the fourth game back here Sunday afternoon.

One of the Georgetown Volunteer Ambulance Service of 1964 is vacant, though the big test for election on Tuesday, Feb. 23rd. Not filled is the office of Immediate Past Chief which the first GVAS Chief, Harold Gilmer had held. Mr. Gilmer, a charter member, and one of the driving forces behind the setting up of the volunteer ambulance service resigned for business and health reasons.

Secretary Cec Davidson commented on Mr. Gilmer's contribution to the service at the annual meeting. He said Mr. Gilmer had been vigorous and dedicated in the role of charter member and Chief and had never hesitated to do his utmost at all times to provide leadership and example in all phases of the work.

The officers elected for 1965 are Chief Dan Scarborough, Deputy-Chief Robert Bradley, Captains Ace Bailey, Ralph Hanke, Lieutenants Chris Walker, Lloyd Swartz, Harry Bradford, Tom Maxena, Jim Jenkins, Ken Thompson, Russell Stephens and William Henderson. Treasurer Doug Peck, secretary Cec Davidson, Entertainment chairman Fred Hus, and Groundskeeper Art Stamp.

Men who had served on the executive during the past term were thanked, and retiring Deputy Chief Paul Poulson earned special mention for his work in recording ambulance runs and submitting weekly reports to the press.

Councillor Roy Ballentine, chairman of the Ambulance Committee, was in the chair for the election. Speaking on behalf of the council he thanked the GVAS members for their diligent and capable service in the past. Mr. Ballentine, a qualified St. John Ambulance First Aid Instructor was accompanied to the meeting by "Le-susci-Anne" a practice dummy used for teaching the mouth-to-mouth method of respiration, and gave an instruction period on the subject.

In reviewing the work of the past year, Dan Scarborough noted that there had been a changeover in men and equipment. Several charter, and long time members had resigned due to pressure of work, and change of residence, but many new volunteers had come forward to serve. Also during

the year the charter member vehicle, the 1961 Chevrolet purchased from the H. C. McClure Funeral Home to inaugurate the service was turned over to the works department. It was replaced by a Cadillac Ambulance to complement the International which has been in use for over six years.

Other notable items included the use of the James St. building for the Driver, Testing Branch of the Dept. of Transport weekly, and the use of the building for various Red

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Cross and St. John Ambulance courses.

The success of the annual dinner and dance indicated that it should be continued and a night has already been confirmed for next winter. The finances of the GVAS are in a sound condition and thanks to the efficient handling of collections by the Municipal office staff, the outstanding accounts for Ambulance service to citizens, have been sharply reduced this past year. Some new equipment to further improve service and patient care is being sought and will likely be found when the corporation budget has been set.
