**CVCA Foundation to Preserve
Old Industry and Historical Sites**

The Credit Valley Conservation Authority Foundation was formally established when the inaugural meeting of the trustees was held last week, (Feb. 27, 1965). Responsible for financing and carrying out the recommendations of the Historical Records Advisory Board, the Foundation was set up by the Credit Valley Conservation Authority.

E. Y. Hardy, Hornby, was elected Chairman. M. E. Parker, Arden, was elected first vice-chairman and J. W. Pawley, Brampton second vice-chairman. Additional trustees are M. K. McMillan, Streetsville and E. M. White, Orangeville. G. W. Bentley, Streetsville, is secretary-treasurer.

Among the projects planned for the Foundation is the preservation and re-creation of industrial buildings which once flourished in the Credit River Watershed, complete with machinery and equipment, if these can be found. Mr. Hardy said that he hopes a great mill and a saw mill may be established in conjunction with one or more reservoirs to be built by the CVCA.

Another exception is the re-building of an electrical generating plant at one reservoir, utilizing some of the obsolete equipment available on the river. Negotiations are being carried out to acquire a single room school house, complete

with desks, stove and slate boards to preserve for posterity the "Little Red Schoolhouse" famed in local history.

Funds for these projects, for which no provincial grants are available, will be sought from corporations and individuals within and outside the watershed, who are enthusiastic about preserving for the

use of generations to come, the visible record of past achievements in the Credit River Valley.

The conductor and director of music is Lt. Derek Stannard who has a distinguished musical background. He has been a member of the Irish Guards Band, the RCAP Tactical Air Command Band, and the Lord Strathcona's Horse Band.

Lt. Stannard was principal cornet in England's famed Hallé Orchestra under Sir Barbrauld. He is at present assistant conductor of the London Symphony Orchestra and is a Lieutenant of the Royal Academy of Music, and an Associate of the Royal College of Music and the Royal Conservatory of Toronto.

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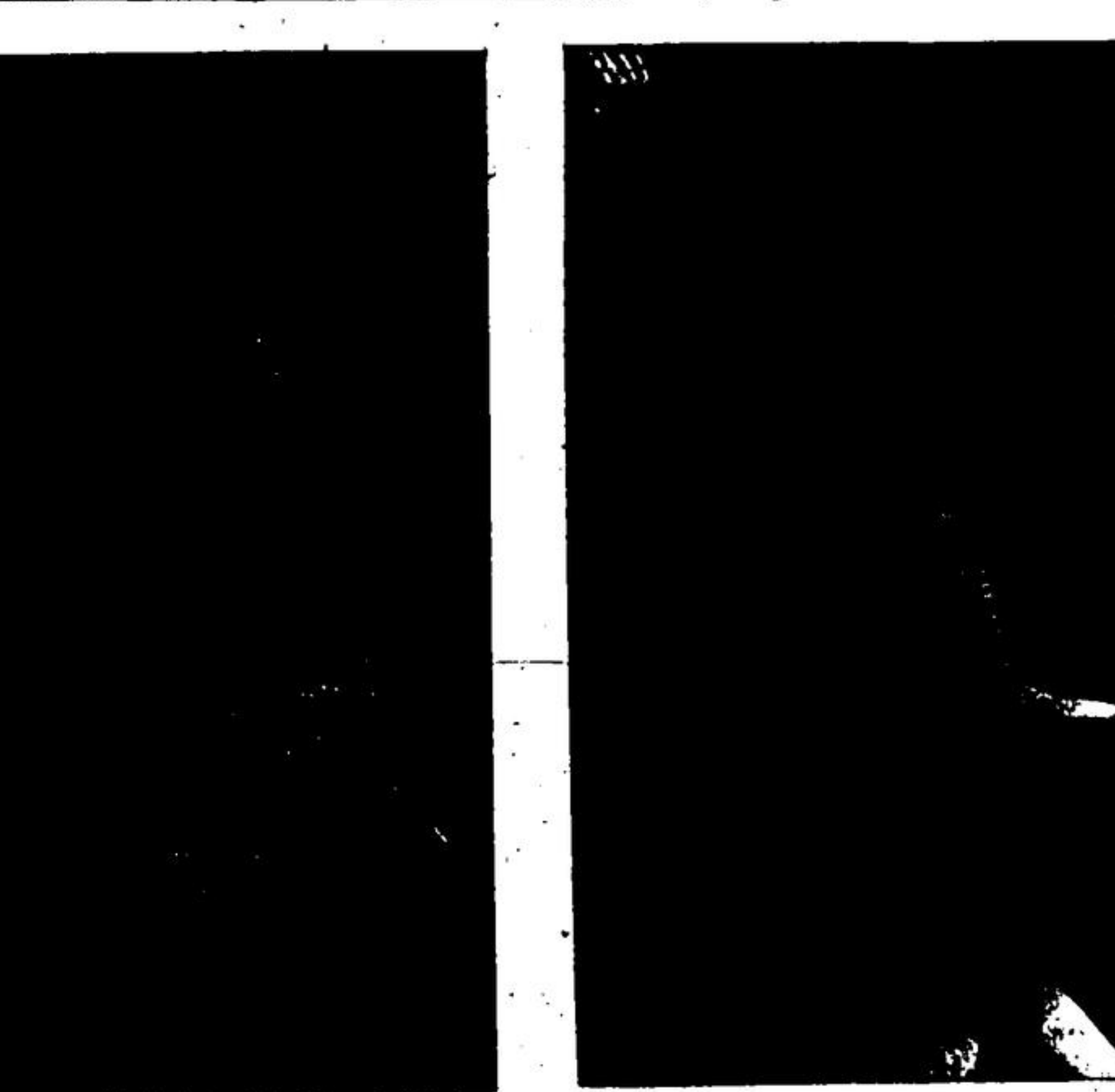
