\$1000 Report Passes Over Four Councillors' Objections

A preliminary report on methods of iron removal from the water system will be undertaken by consulting engineers Proctor and Redfern, according to a motion passed at Council Monday night.

The cost of the analysis and report is not to exceed one thousand dollars.

In advocating the undertaking of the report, Councillor D. Powers spoke of an iron removal plant at Richmond Hill, which seems to be working satisfactorily. The one thousand dollar report will include a detailed analysis of the water, laboratory tests, recommendations of methods of iron removal, and preparation of costs, and methods of financing, according to Mr. Powers.

"The cost of an iron removal plant could range between \$50,000 and \$100,000," admitted Coun. Powers, "but at least we should go ahead and get the detailed report," he added.

"Why pay a thousand dollars for what amounts to a quotation?" demanded Coun. J. Young. "Why not go to the people who make the machinery, they'll make recommendations."

"Every seller is biased," retorted Coun. Powers, "they'll try to convince you they're best."

"I'm not in favour at all," stated Reeve J. Elliott. "It's out of the question to spend that much money to take the iron out." He pointed out that the Ontario Water Resources Commission have a service for research, for which no charge is made.

Councillor T. Ballentine claimed that Town Engineer Carr was in favour of the report. He also claimed that architects don't plan a building for nothing, so why should consulting engineers give their advice for nothing.

"If we are considering spending fifty to a hundred thousand dollars, one thousand is a drop in the bucket," stated Coun. Powers.

On a recorded vote, the motion passed five to four, with Mayor Gibbons, Reeve Elliott, Deputy Reeve Hunter, and Coun. Young opposed.

Cooking Course Project For Ballinafad Institute

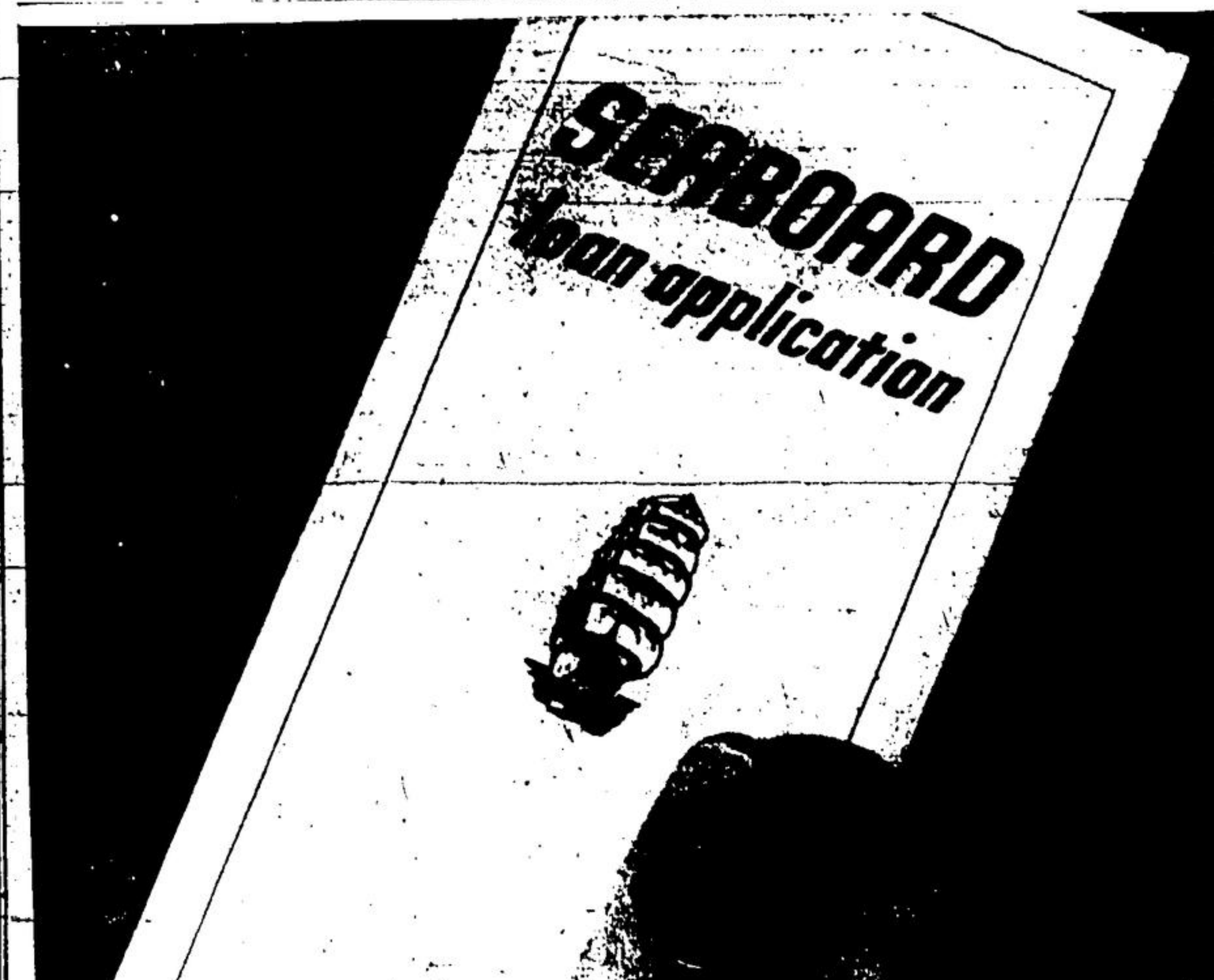

The Institute members sponsored the February birthday party at the Halton Manor re-

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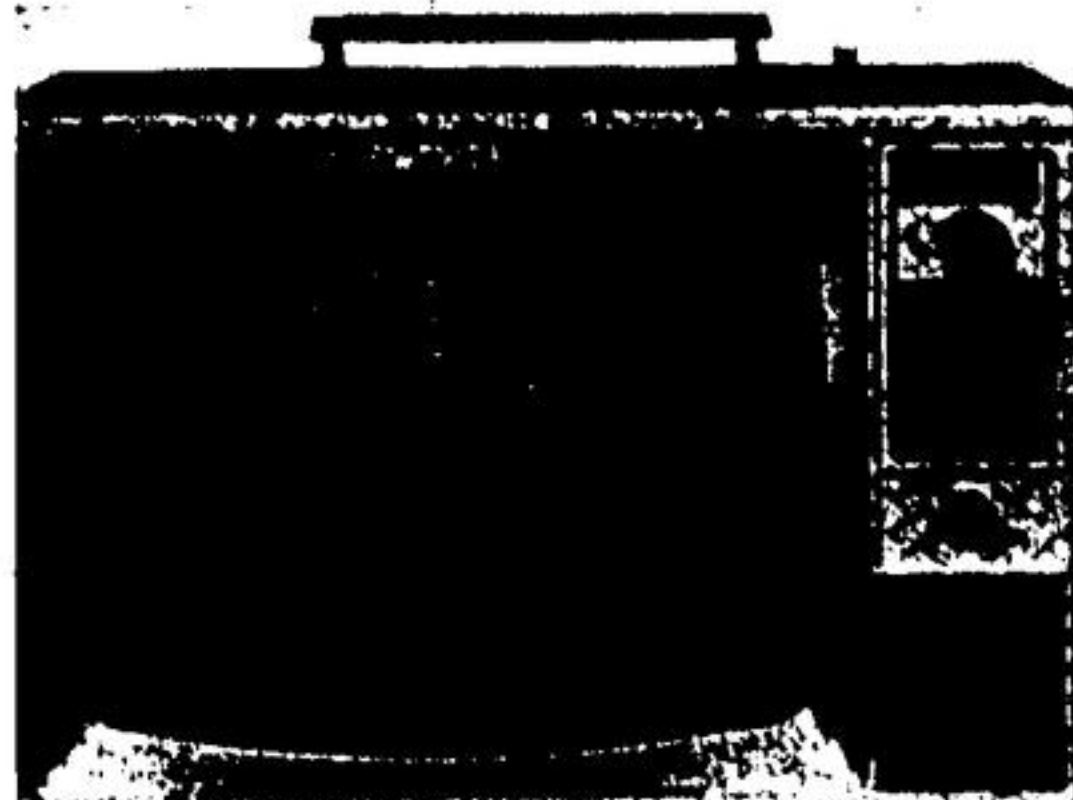
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
