## Blueline Brigade Steady Juniors Even OHA Series

Georgetown Beavers goalie Cuthbert kept Milton Merchants at bay for the final period and a half as Beavers peppered Merchants 7-4 to even their best of 7 playoff series at a game spiced in Milton Wednesday, March 3.

Merchants pulled an upset in winning the opening game 7-8 on Georgetown ice. Beavers outscored Milton 24-21 on the regular season, won 4 of 8 meetings during the schedule, and finished four places ahead of them in the standing.

A crowd of 600, many of whom from Georgetown watched as the play unfolded until the late stage of second period when Beavers got the upper hand. Three Beavers snipers handled all the winning team's scoring, Doug Selby notching three goals, and Jan Popiel and Rod Presswood 2 each.

The Georgetown defence, which handed the puck away too many times in the opening game, was a different unit Wednesday affording Cuthbert the protection he didn't get Sunday and instigating offensive plays that paid off in four scoring plays and accounted directly for two goals.

Part of the improvement was due to the return of Wayne Riddall, one of the Junior B's who stayed with the club. A had hip caused him to miss the first playoff game.

Beavers owned a 2-1 lead at the end of the first period, and 5-4 at the end of second. There was no scoring until 13:40 when Doug Selby finished a smooth three way passing play to send the visitors in front. Two and a half minutes later Georgetown had a 2-0 bulge when Rod Presswood picked a corner with a slap shot from the point, Norton and Riddall collecting the assists. Milton fans let out their

## Stand Off Beavs Rally Milton Wins Third Game

Milton Merchants constructed a 5-2 lead and then staved off a late Georgetown rally to take a 5-4 victory to move in to a one game lead in their Ontario Hockey Association Central League quarter final Friday night. The win gave Milton a 2 to 1 advantage in games in the best of 7 series.

Paul Legree scored a pair of goals for the Merchants while Jim Keane, Roger Wildfong, and Brian Bond each scored once.

Ron Lane, Jan Popiel, Bill Campbell and Doug Selby divided Georgetown Beavers scoring.

Paul Legree opened the scoring for Merchants in the first period with an unassisted goal at 6:08.

Beavers' Ron Lane tied the score on another effort at 13:05. Merchants leaped out in front to stay about a minute after tying goal when Jim Keane scored on a play set up by Brian Bond and Dick Marshall at 14:32.

Beavers' outshot the Merchants by one shot - 37-36.

Two rapid fire tallies in the third took the steam out of the Merchants. Presswood counted his second goal from Popiel and Lane at 11:33, another point shot, and Popiel made it 7-4 with a hard shot from angle at 11:54. Lane led him the pass.

A total of 28 penalties included six fighting majors. Feature bouts were between Riddall and Bouchard, and Popiel and Bertoli in the 2nd, and Kane and Norton in the 3rd. Milton drew 15 sentences to Georgetown's 13.

Milton Merchants' netminder, Frank Marshiori smothered everything Georgetown Beavers could throw at him in the second period then watched his mates take command in the third period to gain a 6-3 win in the 4th game of their OHA Central League playoffs played in Georgetown Memorial Arena Sunday.

Trailing 2-1 at the end of the first frame, Georgetown levelled a merciless barrage of rubber at the Milton cage in the middle period but managed only a single goal partly because of erratic markings. Marshiori's magic Beavers led after their big assault netted only a single goal Milton came on the third period to K.O. their rivals for the third time in the best of seven affair.

The fifth game was played here last night after The Herald went to press.

B. Bond put two pucks in the Beaver net, the others coming from J. Hore, J. Keane, D. Marshall and B. McDuffie.

Ron Lane, Don Norton and Wayne Riddall scored the Georgetown goals, one in each period.

Milton's edge is reflected in the shots on goal - 26 by Georgetown to 33 by the Merchants. Milton also had the best of the penalties 15 to 12.
