ANNUAL REPORT TIME The Company's annual Report for 1964, mailed in February to shareholders in the Georgetown area, has facts and figures that may be interesting to customers and others as well. Take the number of telephones added to the network last year, for example — 222,475 (including 102 in Georgetown). This is almost as many as serve the entire Ottawa-Hull metropolitan area, and is the third time in Company history that over 200,000 telephones were added in a single year (1956 and 1955 also set records). The figure becomes even more impressive when it is realized that it took thirty-three years — from the Company's inception in 1880, until 1913 — to reach the first 200,000 telephones in service.

Even as recently as the First World War, then, telephone service could not be considered the necessity it is today. Most people obviously didn't have telephones (though most businesses surely did) and the number of people you could reach was restricted. Today, of course, the whole pattern is changed. At the end of 1964, the Company had 4.3 million telephones in service, reaching into virtually every office and an estimated 92% of households in our territory in Ontario, Quebec, Labrador, and the Northwest Territories.

And though telephone service has long been absolutely vital to the operations of Canadian businesses — and a single large corporation can require literally thousands of telephones within its offices and plants — we find nevertheless that year after year the proportion of telephones in homes has been creeping up, compared to those in business use. In 1964, for example, 70.8% of our telephones were in homes, compared with 70.5% in 1963, and 69% in 1965.

This to me is a sure indication of the standard of living enjoyed by Canadians, for Canada is one of only a handful of nations where individual families benefit so universally from the security and convenience of telephone service.

And speaking for the Bell, one major reason why this is so is that intensive effort is continually made to keep the cost of this vital service within the reach of any family in our territory.
