Don Norton's Late Goal Sinks Milts in 5th Game

Three unanswered goals in the third period enabled Georgetown Beavers to spoil Milton Merchants plans to cop their quarter-finals playoff series here last Wednesday night. Don Norton, a standout with 2 goals and 2 assists, touched off loud celebrating by the home crowd and stunned a noisy body of Milton backers into 24 karat silence when he scored the winner with just 4 seconds to go on the clock.

The deciding goal came 4 minutes after Doug Selby pulled Beavers even by banging in Bill Campbell's rebound. Ron Lane started the third period rally with a picture play at 7:05.

Milton led 3-2 at the end of the first period and 6-4 after two. Del Beaumont made one change before the start of the final session. Juvenile goalie Fred Cowbrough was dressed and replaced Bob Cuthbert between the pipes.

Cowbrough made three key saves in the third period in blanking the Merchants, the most important on Dick Marshall on a breakaway with the teams deadlocked and three minutes left.

Georgetown went with just two complete lines to Milton's three.

The hard-hitting contest was unusually free of penalties. Just six sentences, all minor, were called, three to each team.

As winners they now enter the league semi-finals against Lou Pontasio's Orangeville Hornets who eliminated Newmarket in another unexpected upset.

Milton, one of the league's weak sisters in the first half of the schedule, played their best hockey of the season to capture their fourth playoff win, two of them on Georgetown's ice.

Joe Hore, Alain Bouchard, Bruce McDuffe and Leon Stickle took care of all the Milton scoring while Georgetown marshaled their defence. Terry Hay, Hay was one of three Georgetown juveniles playing regularly in the final game. The other two were right winger Simon Llewellyn and goalie Fred Cowbrough.

Georgetown was first to score. Jan Popiel jammed the puck past Frank Marshall while the Milton goalie was on his knees at 9:22. Milton was a man short at the time.

Merchants evened it at 15:24 on a spectacular solo effort by Joe Hore who beat two Beaver checks to score after being handed the puck.

Alain Bouchard put the Miltons in front to stay at 4:52 of the middle period, Allan Reid and Keno Hertel drawing assists.

McDuffe put the Merchants up 3-1 less than two minutes later when he banged in Stickle's pass at 6:33.

The Beavers got back in the thick of it before the end of the period on Terry Hay's goal from Bill Campbell.

Georgetown efforts to wipe out the Milton advantage in the third period were stymied by an effective forechecking job which probably was the major factor in Milton success.

Stickle's clincher came with 13 seconds left after a Beaver surge had the throng on the edge of their seats. McDuffe and Roger Wildfong set up the goal.

Frank Marshall made 27 saves and Fred Cowbrough 30.
