## Lornes Keep Both Bands But Grant to Only One

The Lorne Scots Militia regiment intends to keep both its bands operating although it will receive grants for only one.

Major Robert Hardy, who replaces Lieutenant Col. E. F. Copover as commanding officer April 4, made the announcement in a report to County Council.

The Major stated both bands will be retained despite the recent militia shakeup which re-

stricts grants to only one band in a regiment.

In accordance with the new directives, the Pipes and Drums will receive the grant since it will be designated the official band.

The militia band of the unit, the Brass Band, is to be kept up through contributions from rank and file members.

Honorary Col. John E. Barber, of Georgetown, asserted the militia band will be continued although this might mean a "draw" on everyone in the regiment.

The Lorne Scots is one of numerous militia regiments reorganized by the department of National Defence. Its armories at Orangeville and Port Credit were ordered closed.

The Lorne Scots, 100 years old in 1966, is the largest infantry unit west of Rimouski, Quebec.

## Advice to Dairymen from Extension Specialist

Free stall housing and barn and sanitizers. He stressed the importance of using two types of cleaners, rather than just one. He suggested using a soda type cleaner for five days in the week, and an acid type cleaner for the other two days. The soda cleaner removes the fat and protein from the milking machine, pails and bulk tank; whereas the acid type cleaner removes milk stone and water scale. Do not mix these two, or their usefulness will be removed. New milking machine inflations should be purchased every three months, with lid gaskets every six months.

Mr. J. C. Palmer, Associate Director of Dairying, Ontario Department of Agriculture, Toronto, dealt with the importance of cleanliness around the premises of milk producers.

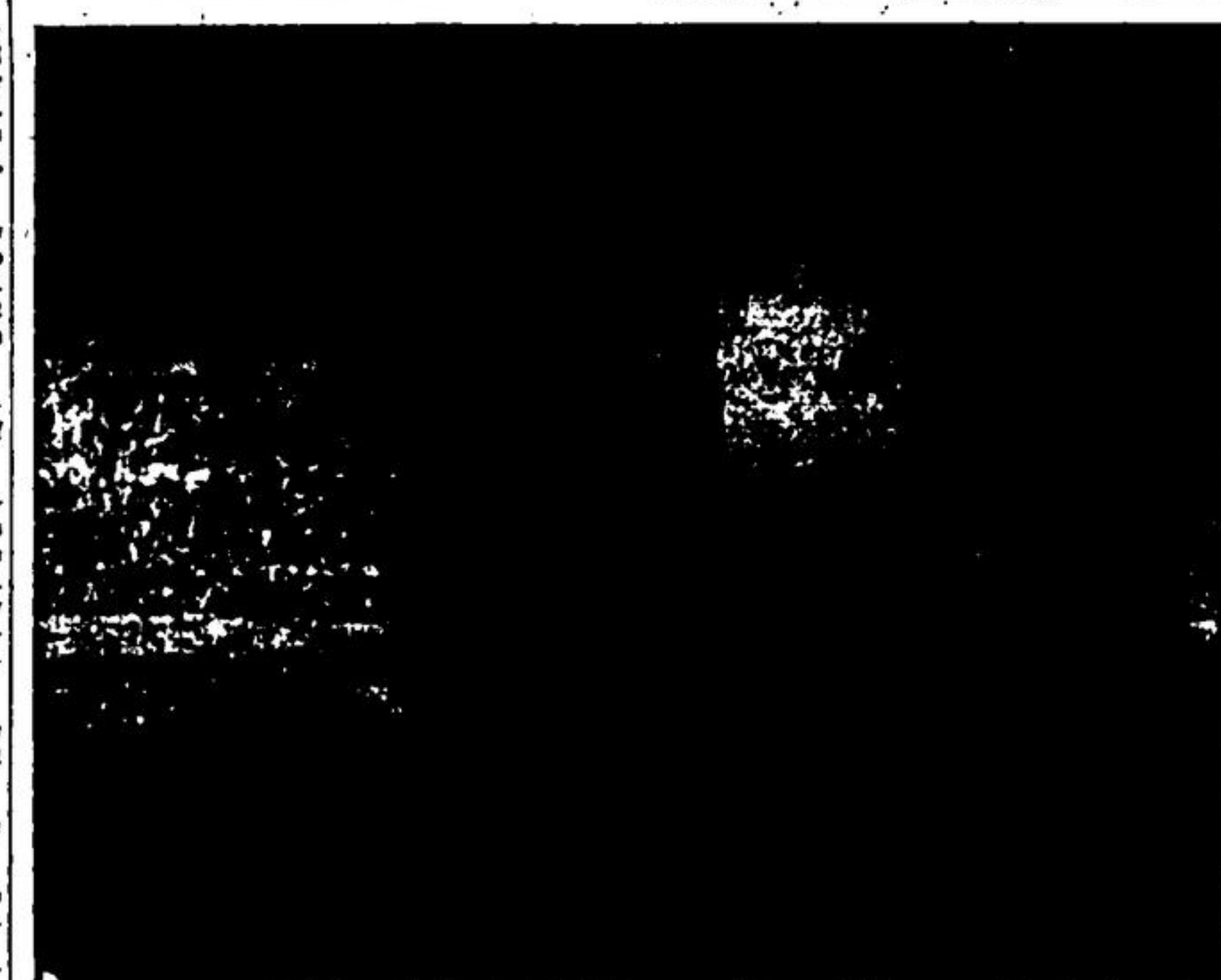

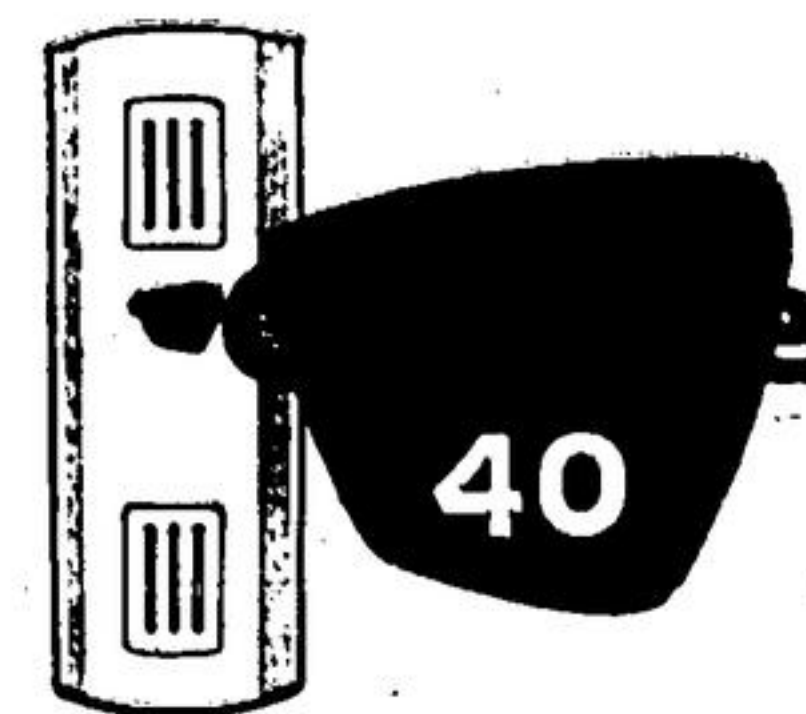
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
