LET'S PLAY BRIDGE

"Cover an honor with an honor." How often have you heard this expression used in bridge games? Like most rules in bridge, it is a good rule as long as you do not use it without thinking.

No rule in bridge will ever replace your ability to think about what a certain play will do.

Let's see the effect of the above rule in action. This is a bridge hand that occurred in a game of rubber bridge.

Dealer - West
East - West vulnerable

North
S-K-Q-8
H-K-3

The bidding:

West	North	East	South

The bidding may require an explanation. South's bid of two clubs is the Stayman convention now widely used. It asks North to bid a four card major suit if he has one. Since North

does not have four cards in either major, he bids two diamonds. Now South shows his spade suit. With good support for spades and an above average no trump opener, North raises to three spades. South can figure that their side has at least 26 points and goes to game.

West leads a heart and declarer pauses to plan his play. There is a "probable loser" in each suit and maybe more in hearts. Because dummy's high trump are needed to draw trumps, declarer cannot ruff hearts in dummy. Therefore, declarer must look to the diamond suit for extra tricks.

Declarer wins the first trick in his hand and leads the diamond queen. Now it is West's turn to think "to cover or not to cover. All West has to do is picture what declarer has and what his partner has in diamonds.

The only play where West should cover is if declarer is leading a singleton queen - a most unlikely play. If West ducks, South can continue with the jack of diamonds. West ducks again. Now the best declarer can do is draw trump and cash the diamond ace, throwing a heart away. Now a club lead lets the opponents in and they take two hearts and a club. Declarer just makes the contract.

If at any time West covers the diamond honors, declarer will take 11 tricks, due to the fortunate drop of the diamond eight and ten from East. Only cover an honor with an honor if it will do your side some good.
