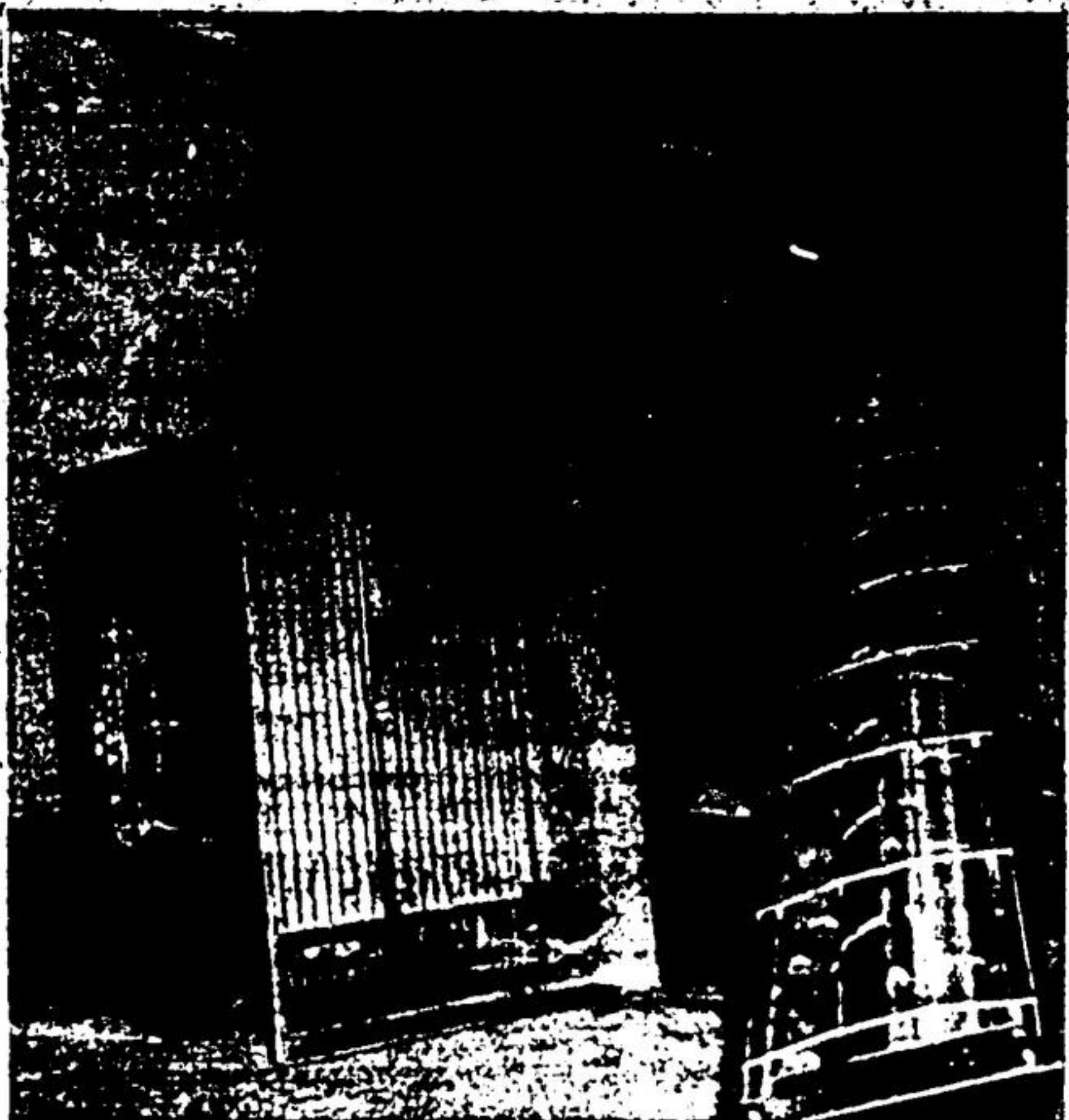

Plax, Pros Vie for Curling Title Sunday

Either Plax or the Pros will own the Georgetown Industrial Curling crown when the league's first final concludes this Sunday afternoon.

Those teams earned a shot at being the first title holders last Sunday when they eliminated their opposition in sudden death semi-final matches.

Plax disposed of The Four Wheels 9 to 2, and The Pros knocked Provincial out of the running with an 11-6 win.

The semi-finalists were the top four clubs in a league which also included The Chiefs, Dornier, Varian No. 1 and Varian No. 2.

Spectators are welcome to witness the final match which starts at 1 o'clock.

Trafalgar First Halton Course to Host "Open"

A district golf course will host the Ontario Open this year. The Trafalgar Golf and Country Club near Hornby will be the scene of the 1965 edition of the major tournament. It was learned last week.

It is the first time a golf event of this magnitude has ever been held in Halton County.

The third annual Open will be a three-day, 54-hole stroke play tournament on June 24, 25 and 26th.

Some of the top professionals and amateurs in the province will be shooting for Carling's \$5,000 top prize.

But the golfers will not just be gunning for the \$5,000. The professional who finishes first in the tournament will be awarded a qualifying spot in the Carling \$200,000 world championship to be played at Kilton, Mass., next August.

Nick Westlock of Mississauga, Alvie Thompson and Phil Brown of Toronto, Moa Norrman of Kitchener and Bob

Panaoski of Windsor are some of the names golfers who are likely to show up at Trafalgar.

Some of Halton's top golfers took part in last year's Ontario open played at Irlington near Toronto.

Paul Williams of Burlington, John Davis of Burlington, Doug Bruton of Georgetown and Ray Romani of Trafalgar represented the area at the tournament.

Williams made the best showing last year, finishing with a fine 228 total.

Cookson finished up with 230, while Romani had 231 and Bruton 232.

Nick Westlock, the 47-year-old veteran who gets better with every year, will likely be on hand at Trafalgar Golf Club come next June trying for his sixth Ontario Championship.

Westlock captured the crown for the fifth time at Irlington last year after firing a brilliant seven-under-par 65 in the first round.

Georgetown Pee Wees will be looking to their non-stars for extra efforts when they meet Leamington Pee Wees for the first game of the OMHA Pee Wee semi-final series in Leamington.

The non-stars, that percentage of players on a hockey club which seldom figures in the scoring, but give 100 per cent effort while taking their shift are often the determining factor in close hockey games.

One member of the Pee Wee executive Bill Korack commenting on the upcoming series said the players overshadowed by their flashy mates may be ones who actually tip the scales. Every team has its standouts but it's the balance of the lineup which determines just how far a team can go, he said.

OB) Continues Midget Juvenile Leagues

The Ontario Baseball Association has rejected a proposal that its juvenile age group be discontinued and the midget division be extended an additional year.

The proposal, put forth by the eastern Ontario division, was one of two rejected at the provincial association's annual meeting Saturday.

The eastern group said the change would be an incentive to keep boys between 17 and 20 interested in the sport. It said midget ball was far out-drawing juveniles and tended to discourage players in the latter group.

The other rejected amendment came from the Hamilton association which asked that visiting minor clubs pay their own travelling expenses.

It was agreed, however, that the home team provide accommodations for the visitors if they plan to stay overnight and play the next day.

W. J. Smith of Toronto, first president of the OBA—has been elected in 1918—called for improved liaison between associations.

Wilfred Johnston of West Lorne was elected president, succeeding Jim Waldie of Milton. Others elected were: Dave Bell, St. Catharines, first vice-president; George Hain, Hamilton, second vice-president.

Spero Annis of Peterborough was re-elected to his fourth term as secretary-treasurer.
