

# Cancer Research Finances Urgent, Meeting is Told

Reg Broomhead of the Georgetown unit of the Canadian Cancer Society was the local delegate to the Central Council District of the Cancer Society in Port Credit recently.

Ontario Division Campaign Representative G. D. Squarebriggs spoke to the Council stressing the urgency to bring to as many people as possible the vital need for financial support for cancer research projects.

John Weber, Brampton president, introduced Mr. Squarebriggs, who has been so successful in promoting the needs of the Cancer Society work. Looking into the future needs, Mr. Squarebriggs said "we must realize that the cost of equipment has risen. It is forecast that the minimum increase will be eight per cent per year for the next five years. One million dollars, at least, is allocated now for the addition to Princess Margaret Hospital. A follow-up clinic at Western Hospital is being set-up, which will cost \$25,000. This is a unique undertaking — the first of its kind on this continent."

Mrs. L. R. Shaw, Unit Campaign chairman for South Peel, introduced by W. E. Wright, South Peel president, gave an outline of the structure of the Branch, Unit, District and their relationship within the framework of the Society.

Mrs. W. Griffiths, Kleinberg, District Campaign Chairman, outlined the purpose of the campaign, stressing the research and educational value, emphasizing the need for early preparation for a successful coverage of the household canvass. Mrs. H. Kenney, Woodbridge, described in detail the work involved for the captains and gave useful hints on the management of a canvass campaign.

On Friday, February 19th, a deputation of Council along with Mr. George Kerr, MPP, waited on Mr. W. J. Spooner, Minister of Municipal Affairs in the Ontario Government, and received directions from him to appoint a committee whose duty it would be to have the damages appraised, to solicit donations from the Public, which would be matched by the Ontario Government and to distribute all monies received on a prorated basis to those entitled to them.
