Georgetown Pee Wees have to beat Leamington by 5 goals here Sunday to stay alive in OMAHA playoff competition.

In the first game of the two game series to coast semi-final series in Leamington Saturday the Georgetown Pee Wees took a 6-2 trouncing and for the first time in their match toward the Ontario crown are in danger of being bounced.
