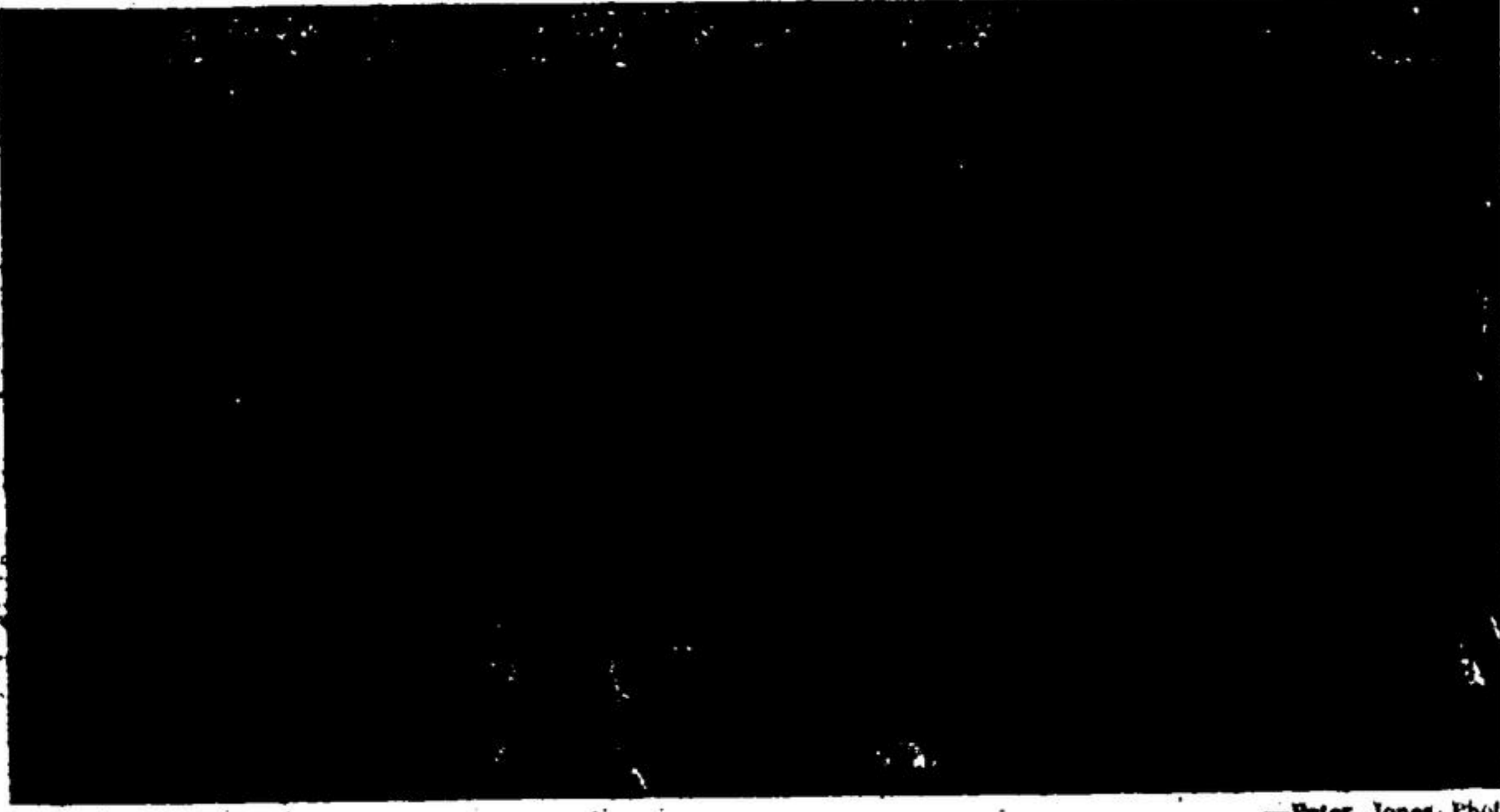

Minor Baseball Plans Indicate Full Season

The Chairman of Minor Ball in Halton County, Bill Richmond, has reported a heavy volume of inquiries into entries from new communities throughout the area. There appears to be a stir in the smaller communities in the association with enquiries coming from such towns as Eriodale, Bramalea, New Toronto, Long Branch, and Clarkson and, via the grapevine, towns such as Ancaster and Fergus.

It was confirmed this past weekend that Hamilton has dropped out in the juvenile class and Bramalea came in with entries from Bramalea to Juvenile, and Eriodale has entered in Juvenile.

Towns returning include Waterloo, Oakville, Burlington, Georgetown, Campbellville, Brampton and Dundas. Deadline for entries has been extended until April 15th due to the extra long hockey season and some associations not knowing what classifications exactly they will have entries in.

Georgetown falls into this category. At present it appears there will be Pee Wee, Bantam, Midget and Juvenile teams with the hopes of a Tyke team. Part of this will hinge on the upcoming meeting of the Georgetown Minor Baseball Meeting on April 14 at which time it will be decided if they will continue with their low all star teams.

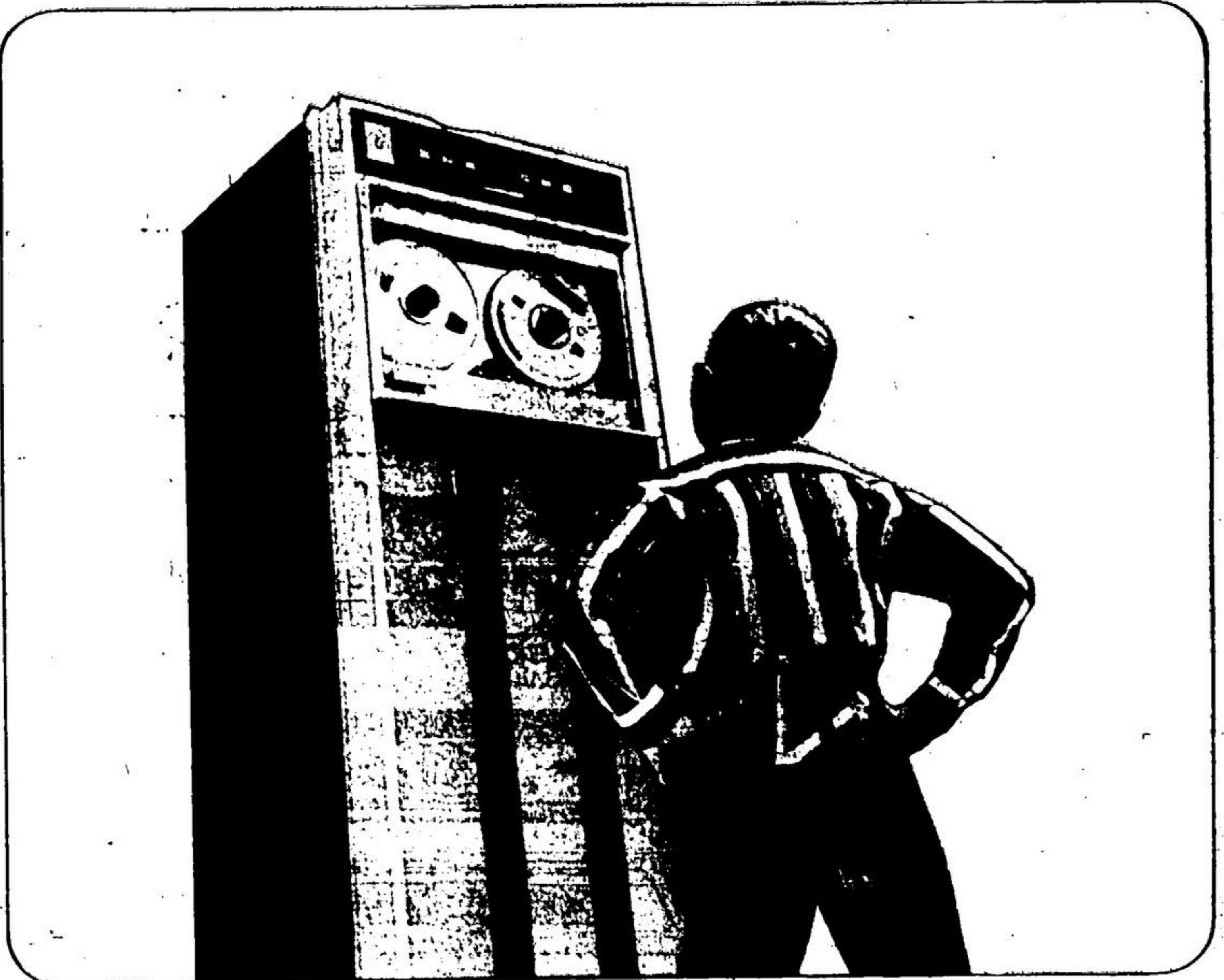
