

# County Oratory Finalist To Compete at Whitby

Eighteen top orators, representing secondary schools in Halton, Peel, York (outside Metropolitan Toronto) and Ontario counties, will compete in a provincial semi-final (zone) public speaking contest on Friday, April 2nd, at Anderson High School, Anderson Street, Whitby, for the honour of representing these four counties in the provincial final speaking contest in Toronto, on April 10th.

The eighteen speakers who will compete at Whitby in this provincial semi-final contest, on April 2nd, are the district finalists for the four counties. They will represent high school students who have taken part in oratorical competitions in secondary schools of Aurora, King City, Newmarket, Acton, Burlington, Milton, Georgetown, Brampton, Woodbridge, Oakville, Whitby, Ajax, and Oshawa during the past few months.

Two winners, one from the prepared speech section, and the other from the impromptu speech section, will be selected by the judges at the Whitby contest, to enter the 1965 provincial final public speaking contest. This will be held on Monday evening, April 19th, during the Ontario Educational Association convention, in Toronto, at the King Edward-Sheraton Hotel. Zone winners from all parts of the province will compete in that final oratorical contest.

One of the major public speaking events of the year, the Friday, April 2nd, provincial semi-final (zone) contest in Whitby is co-sponsored by the Ontario Educational Association, the Ontario School Trustees and Ratepayers' Association and the Ontario Municipal Electric Association (municipal Hydro commissions). The provincial final public speaking contest on April 19th is co-sponsored by Ontario Hydro.

An attractive, engraved silver cup and a suitably engraved Hydro shield, donated by the Ontario Municipal Electric Association, will be presented to the winners of the prepared speech and the impromptu speech sections of the provincial semi-final contest at Whitby. They will also receive

ministers of the cup and the shield to retain. All the runners-up in this contest will receive valuable book prizes.

Prizes will be presented by William J. Fisher, president of the Ontario Municipal Electric Association, District 4, and also by Vice-Chairman James Ross, of Whitby Public Utilities Commission, a member of the O.M.E.A. Principal, W. A. Andrews, of Anderson High School, is making arrangements for the zone oratorical contest, which will commence about 7:30 p.m. on April 2nd.
