\$7000 Surplus Indicated For Town's 1964 Year

"The town was away better off financially at the end of 1964 than a year ago," auditor Graeme Goebelle told Council Monday night. He stated that the town itself had ended the year with a small deficit of \$860, but with grants and rebates that could not be calculated originally, the final figure which will be carried over this year, is a surplus of \$7,134.

The financial statement was not discussed at the meeting but will be discussed in detail at a committee meeting with the auditor.

Pare Committee Estimates Or Tax Rate Rises: Reeve

Reeve John Elliott challenged Council to voice their opinion on the budget, Monday night at Council meeting. "We have had enough study on the budget," he maintained, "now I would like your opinion on whether we should hold the mill rate or put the amounts in the budget that each committee chief wants for his committee, thus letting the mill rate rise."

"Certainly I'd like to see the mill rate reduced," replied the mayor. "Public business should be handled like private business," he contended, "if we can't afford it, we don't." He pointed out that no definite figures had been received from the public and high school boards. "I don't think it's a reasonable question at this time," he summed up.

"Last year you advocated a two mill reduction in the tax rate," answered Reeve Elliott, "if we had reduced the mill rate that much, we would have been \$32,000 in debt, according to the figures the auditor gave us tonight."

"If we hadn't provided for it we wouldn't have spent it," was the Mayor's rejoinder.

"Nobody wants the mill rate to go up," remarked Cr. H. Francis, "but I buy trucks and a garage, not for me, for the town. And if it costs two mills to provide proper police protection in this town, let's spend it," he added.

"The only way to get improvement in the police department is to change the personnel," the mayor concluded.

Mayor Says Calgon Not Needed In Water

"There is very grave doubt in the mind of Mr. Duncan, O. W.R.C. representative as to the value of calgon in the water," Mayor J. Gibbons told Council Monday night. Mr. Duncan is currently making a survey of rust in the town water supply. "In my own opinion," continued the Mayor, "calgon is a detriment."

Water chairman Don Powers explained that a report expected within two weeks should show whether calgon is of any use. He admitted the O.W.R.C. has mixed feelings on the matter. "I assume when the treatment was commenced four or five years ago, an analysis was made," he added.

"One of our problems could be remedied by using less chlorine," commented the Reeve.
